Misses Ruby Ludlum and Odesa Reynolds left Saturday morning for a visit to their homes at Shallotte.

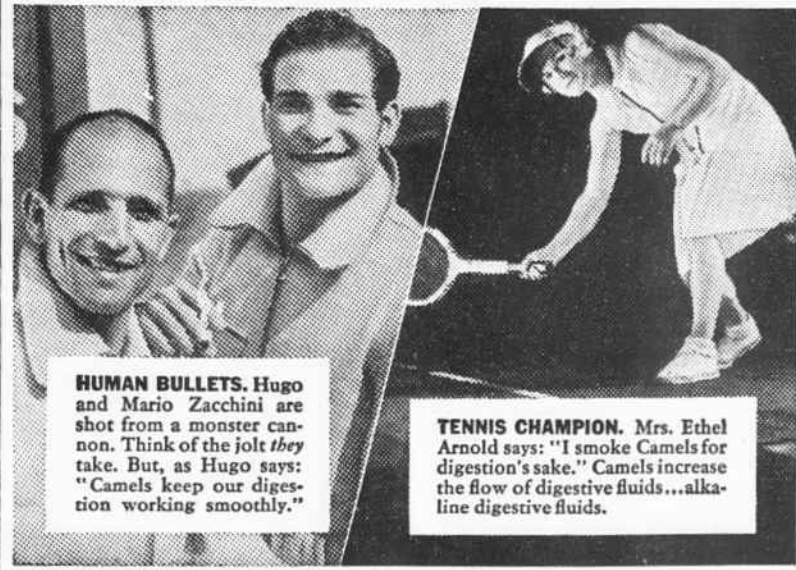
John Galloway, of the Supply section, was a caller on Friday evening.

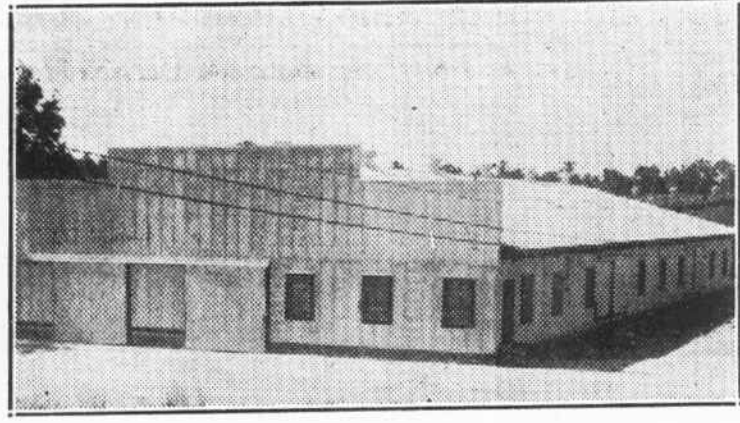
