

Best Counties In 4-H Corn Show

Exhibits From Wilkes And Yadkin Counties Were Outstanding Last Week At N. C. State Fair In Raleigh

Wilkes and Yadkin county exhibits stood out last week in the biggest and best 4-H corn show ever assembled at an N. C. State Fair.

The 20 county exhibits and the 225 individual entries overflowed the allotted space and more room had to be made in an adjacent booth, reported L. R. Harrill, 4-H club leader at State College.

Wilkes won first place with its 100-ear exhibits of white single and white prolific corn varieties and also captured the sweepstakes for the best county 100-ear exhibit in the show.

Don Nichols, of Wilkes, entered a 10-ear exhibit of white prolific that took first place in that class and also merited the sweepstakes for the best individual entry in the 4-H department.

Buster Nichols, of Wilkes, made first place with his 10-ear entry of white single corn. Yadkin's county exhibits of 100 ears in both the yellow single and the yellow prolific captured first places in these classes, and its 100-ear exhibits of white single and white prolific took second places.

Foy Hoots, of Yadkin, ran third in the white single 10-ear field. In the yellow single 10-ear exhibits, J. L. Bray, Jr., John A. Myers, and Leon Thompson, all of Yadkin, won first, second, and third places in order named. Bray also won second place in the yellow prolific.

Johnston county placed second in the yellow prolific and third in the white single and white prolific classes in the county 100-ear exhibits. Hubert Peele, of Johnston, was second in the white single 10-ear class, and Lloyd Laudon, of Johnston, was third in the 10-ear white prolific.

R. Haggard, of Bertie, came in third in the 10-ear yellow prolific, and Cleveland county got third place in the county 100-ear exhibit of yellow prolific.

The individual winners listed above were on individual entries included among the county 100-ear exhibits. Blanche Linville, of Forsyth, won first place with an entry of yellow prolific not included in a county exhibit.

AAA Application Forms Received

Forms Upon Which North Carolina Farmers Cooperating In Soil Improvement Program May Apply For Payment Received

Forms on which North Carolina farmers will apply for payments under the soil-improvement program have been distributed to county agents over the State, said J. F. Criswell, of State College.

Some agents have already started preparing the forms for signature; others will start as soon as all the necessary data are available, he pointed out.

When the forms are ready, the agents will notify the growers. It will be several weeks or more before all the forms are prepared, Criswell added in urging all farmers to wait until they receive notice before they go to their agent's office to sign.

He also pointed out that on each form will be required the signature of every tenant who will share in the payments to be made.

Data to be placed on the application blanks will be assembled from information gathered in the recent check made on growers' compliance with provisions of the program.

Since the checking of compliance has been practically completed in every county, Criswell stated, growers sowing winter legumes during October, or after their farms have been checked, should notify their county agents so they will receive credit for these seedings.

After the applications have been signed, the payments will be distributed as rapidly as possible.

In the East Central Region, which includes North Carolina, the initial payments will be on a basis of 90 per cent to avoid the possibility of a deficit in the AAA treasury.

Later, if it is found that sufficient funds are available, payments to all growers will be increased accordingly, Criswell stated.

Two fields of corn and one of cotton were inspected in Anson county last week by A. D. Stuart, seed specialist of the North Carolina Crop Improvement Association.
