# No Special Form For Wage Record

Already Unscrupulous Agents Are At Work Selling "Special Forms" For Making Wage Report On Social Security Returns

Some unscrupulous or overzealous salesmen and business concerns are working a wage record "racket" against employers, C. R. Parker, Regional Director, Region IV, Social Security Board, warned today. Mr. Parker said: "Reports reaching the office of the Regional Director of Region IV, comprising the District of Columbia, Maryland, North Carolina, Virginia, and West Virginia, indicate that many employers are being imposed on by overzealous or unscrupulous salesmen and concerns seeking to sell one or another bookkeeping or wage record system.

"Some of these systems are represented as official systems. Others are said to be the system approved by the Social Security Board. The fact is that no official system has been devised or approved by the Social Security Board. Any statement to the contrary is a misrepresentation.

Eastern Carolina farmers are arranging to have their broods sown farrow on clean ground where hogs have not run during the past year as a method of controlling parasites in pigs.

Sweet potato growers in Camden and Currituck counties will purchase a truck load of certified sweet potato seed from growers on the eastern shore of Virginia.

Five 4-H club members of Johnston county have purchased 2,000 baby chicks to be fattened and shipped co-operatively as broilers.

"Each employer is free to follow his own system of bookkeeping and record-keeping, provided the system complies with the very simple regulations of the Bureau of Internal Revenue of the United States Treasury Department."

Mr. Parker called attention to Regulations No. 91, Bureau of Internal Revenue, which read in part:

"No particular form is prescribed for keeping the records required by this subdivision. Each employer shall use such forms and systems of accounting as will
