Unusual Names In Applications

Social Security Board Has Applications For More Than 600 People Whose Last Name Begins With Letter "X"

What's in a name? The Social Security Board, which already is handling more than 27,685,000 names under its Federal old-age benefits program has found there are lots of surprising answers to that question, Stacey W. Wadle, in charge of the Social Security Board office at 116 S. Salisbury Street in Raleigh, disclosed today.

Among other things, the Board has found out how little there can be in a name, for it has discovered the ultimate in short ones. It belongs to an individual named E. That's all there is—the full last name. Where the owner is a man or a woman, Mr. Wade would not say, nor would he give out any other information about Mr. or Mrs. or Miss E. in conformance with the Board policy of holding its files confidential.

Some other surprising things have been learned about names.

For instance, there is the letter "X." Can you think of, say, ten surnames that start with the letter "X"? Among the millions who have applied for Social Security accounts there are 608 whose names start with an "X."

As for the other extreme in size of names, the Board has turned up some which really stretch, but to determine which is the longest among the millions in its records would require a separate checking of all the millions of names.

But when it comes to names which could not possibly be shorter, the Board will back its nomination of E to the limit.

Trout Restocking In Western N. C.

Mountain Streams Are Being Restocked By Government Agents As Answer To Fishermen's Prayer

Izaak Walton followers in the Tarheel state will find real news in the announcement by H. E. Ochsner, Supervisor of the Pisgah National Forest, that 61,000 trout have been placed in the new fish rearing station recently constructed on the Davidson River by the U. S. Forest Service.

The fish were brought to the Pisgah Forest from the trout hatchery of the Bureau of Fisheries located at Wytheville, Va. The 40,000 rainbow and 21,000 brook trout were shipped from the hatchery in a special railroad car. This shipment brought the number of fish placed in the 18 pools to a total of 80,000.

A broad program of fish restocking in the Pisgah National Forest has been launched through the co-operation of the U. S. Forest Service and Bureau of Fisheries. A survey of all streams in the North Carolina National Forest will be conducted by fish culturists from the Bureau of Fisheries.

The rearing pool system of trout restocking is far superior to the old method of releasing the young fingerlings in the rapid streams. Carried over in a rearing pool until a mature size has been reached, the trout offer a definite answer to the angler's prayer.

"While timber production and management are the primary interests of the U. S. Forest Service, we are anxious to make our forests and streams attractive to sportsmen," said Supervisor Ochsner.
