

Marker To Anna M. Whistler Unveiled At Clarkton Friday

Hon. Josephus Daniels, U. S. Ambassador To Mexico, Offers Glowing Tribute To Whistler's Mother

MANY DIGNITARIES ARE ON PROGRAM

Marker Stands In The City Limits Of Clarkton Near The Girlhood Home Of The Model For Famous Portrait

Clarkton, May 13. — Bladen county today paid homage to the memory of its most illustrious daughter, Anna Mathilda McNeill Whistler, model for the famous portrait by her son which has made her emblematic of the American mother.

The occasion was the unveiling of a marker on highway 701 within the city limits here marking the spot where Mrs. Whistler's girlhood home stood 1,300 feet away.

An outstanding list of notables was headed by Honorable Josephus Daniels, United States Ambassador to Mexico, who offered a glowing tribute to the life of the woman to whom thousands had gathered to pay honor.

The ceremonies began at 11:00 in the high school auditorium, which was packed to capacity. Many were denied admittance to the building.

Mrs. D. S. Currie, regent of the Battle of Elizabethtown Chapter, of the Daughters of the

American Revolution, which organization was presenting the marker, presided over the ceremonies, and offered greetings to the visitors and distinguished guests.

Two important personages scheduled to have places on the program were Congressman J. Bayard Clark, who was detained by pressing business in Washington, and Dr. C. G. Vardell, president emeritus of Flora McDonald College, who was unable to attend because of the illness of his wife.

One of the high lights of the program was the discourse of Robert Lister, XLV, the MacNeil of Barra, who traced the history of the MacNeill clan through centuries down to the present day. He heads the MacNeil Clan which now extends to every country on the globe.

Mr. Daniels was introduced to the audience by Mrs. E. F. McCulloch, editor of the Bladen Journal, as well as chairman general of the Committee for the Unveiling Ceremonies. Music interspersed the program, being furnished by the Bladenboro High School band, and vocal renditions by Mrs. Tom Woods and Miss Mary Currie.

At the conclusion of the main address, the unveiling ceremonies followed at the marker. Mrs. Currie, regent of the Battle of Elizabethtown Chapter, presented the marker to Mrs. Eugene Davis, State regent. County Attorney, Hector H. Clark, accepted the marker for Bladen county,

Defends Agents From Criticism

Schaub Defends County Agents From Unfair Attacks As Result Of Crop Allotments

his close association with the new county agent, because of farm act, has been the target of much undesired criticism since cotton and tobacco allotments were announced, says Dean I. O. Schaub, of State College.

In a few communities, some disgruntled farmers have been clamoring for the agent's dismissal, basing their argument on apparent "unfairness."

"Thus we have a strange situation," the director of the Extension Service said. "The county agent is put in much the same position as a tax collector. He has orders which he must carry out that were formulated by the Congress of the United States. His duties are purely administrative."

Dean Schaub explained that county committees determined acreage allotments for individual farms after a careful study was made of the county and according to a formula set up in the Act. After the allotments were completed, they were announced through the office of the county agent, headquarters for the AAA program in each county.

"National goals were set up in Washington, and each state given its proportionate share of acres," Dean Schaub said. "In the case of cotton, even county goals were established in Washington. For tobacco, the State committee set each county's quota, which was approved by the AAA regional office in the national capital."

"We think that only a small part of the growers are campaigning actively against the program. Most of the others are still willing to go along with us in order to give control a fair chance. If they don't like it after the marketing season is over, they can vote down the program at the next referendum."

State Leads In Pox Treatment

Veneral Disease Clinics Are Held In Columbus County Morning At 9:00 O'clock... Announcement Says

Raleigh.—North Carolina has more clinics for the treatment of syphilis than any other state in the union. This statement was made by Dr. F. S. Fellows, past surgeon, United States Public Health Service, now acting venerable disease consultant with the State Board of Health, following the announcement by Dr. Carl V. Reynolds, State Health Officer

that, on May 1, there were 105 such clinics, scattered throughout the commonwealth.

"So far as I know, no other state can match this number," Dr. Fellows said.

In making the announcement, Dr. Reynolds pointed out the fact that none of these present clinics was the result of money from the Smith Reynolds Fund but emphasized the prospects for a greatly increased number when the proceeds from this fund, which has placed North Carolina far in the lead in its war on syphilis, have been put to work.

North Carolina also stands out, he said, the state, one of whose representatives in the Congress of the United States, A. L. Bulwinkle, introduced, with Senator LaFollette, the measure which will eventually mean the eradicating of syphilis, if put into operation as it sponsors intend it should be.

For the information of people in this county, Dr. Floyd Johnson has announced that venerable disease clinics are held in Columbus county each Saturday here in Whiteville at 9:00 o'clock.

"Each clinic is in charge of a qualified physician and is operated by an organized county or city health department, or in the case of a few exceptions, by the county quarantine officer or some interesting local organization," Dr. Reynolds said.

Women Advocate Birth Control

N. C. Federation Of Women's Clubs And The Social Service Go On Record As Favoring Birth-Control

Raleigh, May 16.—The North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs and the North Carolina Conference of Social Service have both gone on record as unanimously favoring "a scientific birth-control program, under medical direction, through channels of public health for indigent mothers in this state."

Furthermore: "We desire to see birth-control centers established in every county in the State for mothers who, for economic reasons, are dependent upon the Board of Health and are entitled to have a reliable source where birth-control advice may be obtained."

(Continued from page 1) For four crucial years of the revolutionary war, has been accorded at last to the official record of that decisive American victory of February 7, 1776. "The Proceeding of a Party of Loyalists in North Carolina, a military report written in narrative form and based on the recitals of fleeing Tories who escaped death or capture at Moores Creek Bridge, was forwarded to London in April, 1776, by Sir William Howe, then commander-in-chief of the British forces in America. The files of the British public records office have contained the buried documents until recently when copies were made available in the United States.

Burned To Death

A pre-dawn fire that turned the 30-year-old Terminal hotel of Atlanta into a flaming inferno in ten minutes time killed 27 persons and left a score more missing or injured Monday. Engineers estimated it might be two days before the wreckage was cleared and the full toll determined. The hotel register was lost. The blaze broke out in the basement of the 5-story, brick and frame building about 3 a. m. when most of its guests were asleep. Flames and smoke shot skyward in a moment every floor was ablaze.

Advices That Paralysis May Be Ended Among Oysters

(Continued from page 1) tually starve to death.

This parasite among oysters has a life akin to the malaria germ among humans, Dr. Metcalf says. It is born in the body of another animal, termed the host, and transmitted in the form of egg-like structures to its victim. Once in the blood stream, the parasite multiplies by thousands in a short period.

Malaria is controlled by killing the mosquito bearing the germ mothers. In like manner, Dr. Metcalf stated, the oyster parasite is controlled by eliminating the mud crab in which it is born.

Control can be effected merely by cleaning the oyster beds once a year of all mud crabs, which have no economic importance, said the State College zoologist.
