

N. C. Federation Of Women's Clubs And The Social Service Go On Record As Favoring Birth-Control

Raleigh, May 16-The North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs and the North Carolina Conference of Social Service have both gone on record as unanimously favoring "a scientific birth-control program, under medical direction, through channels of public health for indigent mothers in this state."

Furthermore: "We desire to see birth-control centers established in every county in the State for mothers who, for economic reasons, are dependent upon the Board of Health and are entitled to have a reliable source where birth-control advice may be ob-
