COLUMBUS PEOPLE ASKED TO ATTEND FORESTRY MEETING
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tion of local chambers of commerce, lumbermen, pulpwood operators, loggers, farmers and

others.
The purpose of these meetings, Graeber said, is to create and promote a greater interest in the protection, management, and use of forest lands and forest resources of Eastern North Carolina.
Particular stress will be laid on a program of integrated or balanced utilization of timber resources in a manner that will maintain industries and a balanced economical situation in each community.

The local meeting, is to be held at Wilmington, May 26 and 10 o'clock. Morning and afternoon sessions will be held, with addresses to be delivered by leaders in forestry work.

The Wilmington meeting will be for farmers in Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, Duplin, New Hanover, Onslow, and Pender Counties.

The schedule of the program for the meeting to be attended by farmers from this section is as follows:

Guy A. Cardwell, vice-president of the N. C. Forestry Association, will preside over the meeting to be held in the Cape Fear Hotel at Wilmington.

R. W. Graeber, of State College, secretary of the Forestry Association, will explain the purposes of the meeting.

The findings of a forestry survey in Eastern North Carolina, and their significance on the methods of cutting pine stands, will be discussed by a representative of the Appalachian Forest Experiment Station.

"Cutting Practices Suggested for Old Field Pine," will be the subject of a talk by Prof. William Maughan, of Duke University. A. E. Wackerman, industrial forester from Norfolk, will discuss "The Forest Industries of Eastern North Carolina and the Need for Integrated Utilization."

"Can We Re-Develop a Naval Stores Industry in North Carolina, and How?" will be the subject of talks by Lenthall Wyman, professor of forestry at State College, and Dan Herring, of the Wilmington Naval Stores Company.

J. S. Holmes, state forester, will open the afternoon session with a talk on "Protecting North Carolina Forests." R. W. Graeber will point out the place of farm woodlands in the forestry program.

G. H. Lentz, of the U. S. Forest Service, will speak on "Pulpwood Cutting, Its Place in the Forestry Program."

S. C. Sweeney, of Wilmington, will discuss pulpwood cutting and its place in the forestry program from the viewpoint of the operator.

Farmers attending the meeting will be given opportunity to

ask questions and express their opinions about various forestry subjects.

RIVER SURVEY ON WACCAMAW
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lumbus County, North Carolina, from which it flows in a general southwesterly direction for a water distance of 244 miles into Winyah Bay, near Georgetown, South Carolina. The Federal Government assumed jurisdiction of this river as early as 1880, and for a number of years a small appropriation was made for work on the upper reaches of the river, removing logs, snags, etc., in order to render it navigable for boats drawing not over three feet of water. While the Government still spends money on this river for navigation purposes it has abandoned for such purpose the upper reaches of the river, and no longer makes any appropriation for work of any kind thereon. Consequently the upper reaches of the river have become clogged with sunken logs, snags,

and debris of various kinds. From its source at Waccamaw Lake down the river for a distance of thirty or forty miles the river is exceedingly crooked and is a slow moving stream. On account of this fact and the obstructions aforesaid the water moves out very slowly, and under any unusual rainfall at all the result is that not only the swamp land immediately adjacent to the river is flooded, but because of the abnormal amount of water accumulating in the river and the adjacent swamps, it is impossible to procure proper drainage of the highlands lying further back, the whole adjacent country being flat. It is estimated that five hundred square miles are adversely affected by this condition, which is apparently getting worse, year by year.
