ON WACCAMAW (Continued from page 1) lumbus County, North Carolina, from which it flows in a general southwesternly direction for a water distance of 244 miles into Winyah Bay, near Georgetown, South Carolina. The Federal Government assumed jurisdiction of this river as early as 1880, and for a number of years a small appropriation was made for work on the upper reaches of the river, removing logs, snags, etc., in order to render it navigable for boats drawing not over three feet of water. While the Government still spends money on this river for navigation purposes it has abandoned for such purpose the upper reaches of the river, and no longer makes any appropriation for work of any kind thereon. 


