A Final Pre-Primray Message.

1. I have been a citizen here for the last ten years. My citizenship is still here and I have never moved it since I first registered here. My home is here and my office is here. The law partnership tentatively formed at Newton, N. C., was never carried into effect.
2. I am a land owner and a tax payer in Brunswick. I now own one-half interest in about 2000 acres of land. There are some taxes charged against me unlawfully and unjustly, on two tracts of land, one owned by C. Ed Taylor, another owned by a colored fraternal organization in Wilmington. I have tendered a check to the tax collector in full settlement of all taxes due, namely: \$25.85, after deductions are made for taxes on the above two tracts of land. That is the truth about taxes I owe.
3. I served as County Supt. of Schools for nearly seven years. During that period three high schools were organized and all the high schools and some of the elementary schools were raised to the standard type. Transportation was organized and an efficient system of records was installed. Practically all of the salary paid me during the seven years was provided by the State of North Carolina, and not by the county. The total amount paid me has recently been greatly exaggerated.
4. I served two terms in the General Assembly, 1935 and 1937. I was honored by being placed on the following committees: (a) Appropriations; (b) Education; (c) Penal Institutions Chairman; (d) Commercial Fisheries Chairman; (e) Congressional Districts; (f) The Journal; (g) Judiciary No. 2; and others.
5. I was instrumental in helping to enact some important laws for Brunswick County, such as: (a) The Removal of Tolls from the bridge at Wilmington; (b) The Reduction of Auto License Fees; (c) Establishment of Port Commission for the City of Southport; (d) Delinquent Tax Adjustments by the County Commissioners with Tax Payers; (e) Authority to sell Bald Head Island to the Department of Conservation and Development; (f) A bill Memorializing Congressmen to Endorse Application for Loan to City of Southport for Port Terminal, and other bills.
6. I assisted in the passage of many State-wide bills that were beneficial to Brunswick County, relating to schools, roads, taxation, social security, and so on. At the same time I had Brunswick County exempted from the provisions of many bills that would have laid a burden upon the county.
7. I am personally acquainted with all State officials, commissions, heads of State Departments and State Institutions, and members of the House and Senate.
8. I offer the voters of Brunswick services in the General Assembly, not based upon wild guesses, but upon acquaintance and ripe experience. Vote for me and get the benefit of service based upon actual knowledge and experience.
