(Continued from page 1) sion in order to take advantage of the Federal funds." The Governor said he had personally investigated the possibility

of delaying PWA applications until after the regular session of the General Assembly but found that absolutely no applications could be received that late.

Because only a skeleton clerical staff would be necessary, the special session will probably not cost the State much, the Governor said, and in the long run, a special session would be an economy, if the expenditure authorized were necessary anyway.

Under the present PWA program, the Federal Government grants 45 per cent of total costs for public works construction and the sponsoring governmental unit must furnish 55 per cent. Treasurer Charles M. Johnson estimated that the State could issue approximately \$6,000,000 worth of bonds without a vote of the people, thereby enabling the State to apply for projects costing a total of \$11,000,000.

Only "indispensable projects" are being considered by Governor Hoey in studying the reports on the institutions. He said, "We would not want to build something just because we could get 45 per cent from the Government," he said.

The last special session of the General Assembly was called by Governor Ehringhaus in December, 1936, to enable the State to participate in the Federal Social Security program. In that case, the newly elected legislature was convened. It adjourned and met again in January. The same Assembly will meet again for the third time in less than two years, an unprecedented action in recent years, at least.
