Soybeans Good Feed For Cows
Soybeans will grow well in sandy soils and provide late summer grazing for dairy cattle in Eastern North Carolina, said A. C. Kimrey, extension dairy specialist at State College in telling of a demonstration conducted in Dare County this summer.
Mrs. R. Bruce Etheridge, of Manteo, and B. A. Williams, of Wanchese, conducted the experiment by growing the soybeans in narrow rows, and having several fields for the cows to graze in rotation.
Williams planted two fields of about three acres each, and let the cows graze in one and then the other. He would leave them in one field until they had most of the leaves off, but not long enough for them to graze too close to the stalks.

Decline Noted On Feed Stuffs
Feedstuff decline during the past week, influenced by slower inquiry for the increased offerings and easiness in feed grains reports the U. S. and North Carolina Departments of Agriculture. Wheat millfeed prices averaged almost \$2.00 per ton lower with market supplies large and inquiry slow. High protein feeds were a little easier. Soybean meal was considerably lower at some points and discounts were given from current prices for later deliveries. Cottonseed meal was unsettled with price declines at South Georgia mills but higher quotations at North Texas mills. Linseed meal was also unsettled. The index of wholesale feedstuff prices dropped 95.2 (1935-36 100) compared with 97.2 the previous week and 95.4 two weeks earlier. A year ago, the index stood at 108.9, two years earlier at 139.1 and 3 years back at 98.9.
Compared with last Friday at Chicago, all classes of hogs sold from 10 to 50 cents lower with medium weight butchers taking the full down-turn. Slaughter sheep showed little change but yearlings were steady to strong and fat lambs were strong to 25 cents higher. The top for fed steers advanced to \$13.50 and several loads made \$13.35, \$13.40 and \$13.45. Strictly good and choice medium weight and weighty offerings were substituted for highly finished kinds and were as much as 50 cents higher in instances. All grades of cows were mostly 25 cents higher while wealers were 25 to 50 cents lower.
The poultry market weakened on some classes during the period, while eggs were firm to stronger. In Washington young turkey hens held steady but toms lost 1 cent per pound; all sizes of colored fowl sold steady at 15 to 18 cents, and Virginia Rocks, broilers and fryers, at 16 to 18 cents per pound. Government graded and dated eggs, U. S. Extras, large, white, were 2 cents stronger in Washington at 41 1/2 cents; ungraded, white, current receipts gained 1 cent during the period and wholesaled at the week-end at 29 to 30 cents per dozen.
A few lots of 1937 Virginia Type peanuts continued to come to market, but prices are lower perhaps because of the figures in the diversion schedule for the new crop Virginia Type goods. Prices are fully 1/4 cent lower than last week and farmers' stock Jumbos are now quoted at 3 3/4 cents with bunch at 3 1/2 cents per pound delivery.
Chuck prices were the contributing factor to a strong wholesale steer market in New York and the market closed strong to 50 cents higher. The lamb market opened strong to \$1.00 higher and closed steady to 50 cents

Exhibit To Show Progress Of AAA
An exhibit showing how the agricultural conservation program helps North Carolina farmers, business men, and consumers—prepared under the direction of H. A. Patten, acting AAA executive officer at State College—is being displayed at the State Fair this week.
Part of the exhibit shows how farmers carry out soil-building practices to meet the requirements of the program. These practices include planting legumes and winter cover crops, turning under legumes to add fertility to the soil, terracing fields to check erosion, and applying lime and phosphate to the land.
By participating in the program, the farmers not only improve their land, balance their farming practices, and increase their income, but they also assure city consumers an adequate future supply of food and raw products for manufacturing. This phase of the program is also stressed in the exhibit.
Another phase shows how the increased purchasing power of farm people means greater sales by merchants, and in turn increased factory production. This boosts business and provides work for city dwellers. And as their purchasing power increases, they are able to buy more of the farmers' products.
The effects of the program tend to run in a circle, with the benefits of one group being passed on to others until they come back to the original group, Patten pointed out.


