orange juice and grated orange peel. Fill the orange shells with the potato mixture, add a dash of nutmeg, and place a fresh marshmallow on top. Arrange in a baking pan and put in the oven for a few minutes until marshmallows are browned. Serve on a small platter or chop plate.

CINNAMON APPLES
6 tart apples
1/2 c red cinnamon candies
1/2 c sugar
1 c. water
Make a syrup of the water, sugar and candies. Peel and core apples and place in a deep pan. Pour syrup over apples and cook until tender, basting often with the syrup. Take care that apples do not become too soft.

HARVARD BEETS
For 3 cups of cooked beets cut in cubes prepare a sauce as follows: Melt 2 tablespoons of butter in a sauce pan. Add 2 tablespoons of flour and mix to a smooth paste. Add 1-3 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup water and 1/2 cup vinegar. Cook, stirring constantly, until the mixture thickens. Add the cubed beets and reheat before serving. If canned beets are used, 1/4 cup of beet juice in place of water will give a deeper color to the sauce.

MOLDED CRANBERRY SALAD
2 c. cranberries
1/2 c. sugar
1 c. water
1 c. celery
1/2 c. chopped nuts
1 T. gelatin
1/4 c. cold water
Salt to season
Cook cranberries in 1 cup water until berries are all broken, add sugar and cook about five minutes more. Soak gelatin in 1/4 cup of cold water. Add gelatin to cranberries. When mixture begins to set add celery and nuts. Pour into molds. Chill. Serve in nests of lettuce with mayonnaise.

CHRISTMAS VEGETABLE SALAD
1 1/2 c. diced cooked beets
1 1/2 c. canned string beans cut in inch lengths
Shredded cabbage or Lettuce leaves
French dressing
Boil canned beans 10 minutes and then chill before serving. Let diced beets and cut string beans stand in French dressing for at least one hour. Do not combine vegetables. Arrange vegetables in separate adjoining mounds on bed of shredded cabbage or lettuce. Serve with French dressing.

AMBROSIA
6 oranges peeled and thinly sliced
1/2 c. powdered sugar
1 coconut grated
Arrange layer of orange slices in serving dish, and sprinkle with sugar and coconut. Repeat until all ingredients are used, topping

SCALLOPED OYSTERS AND CELERY
1 pint fresh oysters
2 c. chopped cooked celery
20 crackers (large)
2 c. milk
4 T. butter
1 t. chopped parsley
2 t. salt
1/4 t. pepper
Cook celery until tender. Place a layer of cracker crumbs in bottom of baking dish; add a layer of celery and oysters, repeat until dish is full, having crumbs on top. Dot with butter over top and pour milk to which has been added the salt, pepper and parsley. Bake in a moderate oven until brown.

STUFFED ORANGES
4 c. mashed sweet potatoes
6 oranges
12 marshmallows
2 T. butter
Salt
Nutmeg
Cut oranges in halves, remove the pulp, leaving the shells for stuffing. Boil, mash and season potatoes with salt, butter, a little

with coconut. Chill.
DATE BARS
1 c. sugar
3 eggs
1 c. chopped nuts
Pinch of salt
1 c. chopped dates
1 c. flour
1 t. baking powder
Beat egg yolks and add sugar. Beat whites and add alternately with dry ingredients. Add dates and nuts. Bake in a shallow pan in a moderate oven, for 30 minutes. Remove from pan, cut in small bars and roll in powdered sugar.

70 PER CENT
Flue-cured tobacco growers have been allotted 754,000,000 pounds of leaf under the 1939 AAA program, says E. Y. Floyd, AAA executive officer at State College. North Carolina will receive approximately 70 per cent of this amount if more than two-thirds of the growers throughout the flue-cured area vote in favor of quotas on December 10.

SMALLER
The U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics expects the 1939 Irish potato crop to total about 310,000,000 bushels, a crop smaller by 60,000,000 bushels than that of 1938.

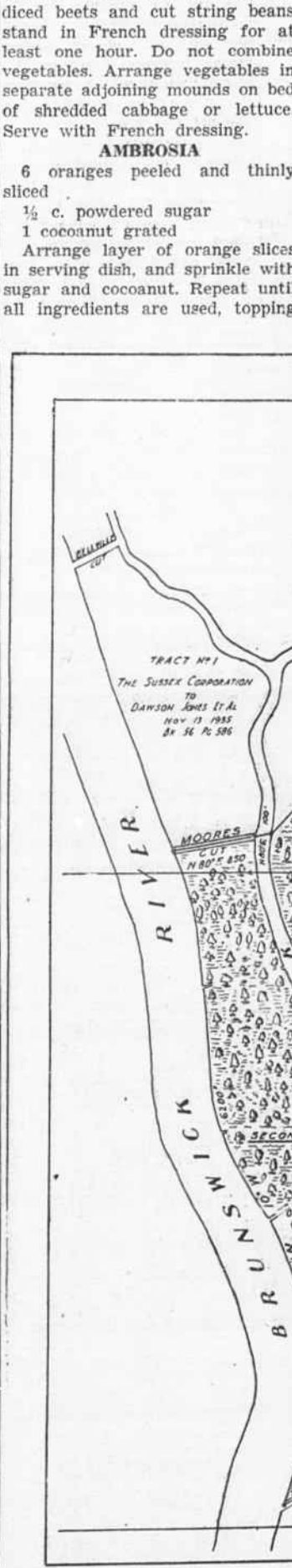
