Grading Contract On Highway 130 Planned July 11

This Project Has Been Added To The Gigantic \$1,400,000 Letting Scheduled Early Next Month

EARLIER BIDS ON JOB WERE REJECTED

These Will Be The Second Bids Received, Since The Earlier Bids Were In Excess Of Allocation

Of interest to citizens of Columbus and Brunswick counties will be the announcement yesterday of W. Vance Baise, chief engineer for the State Highway and Public Works Commission, that the last connecting link of the Whiteville Shallotte sector of Highway 130 will be among the July 11 contracts.

This was one of three projects added to the \$1,400,000 letting scheduled for the 11th of July, and calls for the improvement of Route 130 in Brunswick county.

This project was up for consideration some weeks ago, and bids which were received for the grading work and structures were deemed by the Highway and Public Works Commission as excessive, being more than the funds allocated for the purpose, and the bids were accordingly rejected.

Commissioner A. F. Powell, Jr., of Whiteville, said at the time of the first letting that the paving project was expected sometime within the next year, as soon as the road bed had had time to settle after the grading work.

Three Persons Drown In Surf Near Shallotte

Were Members Of Swimming Party Saturday Afternoon And Apparently Died When Caught In Strong Tide

YOUNG SHALLOTTE BOY WAS HERO

Twelve-Year-Old Robert Lee Cheers Saved One Man And Made Heroic Attempt To Rescue Woman

Three persons were drowned Saturday afternoon while swimming in the surf at Little Beach a few miles from Shallotte and only the heroic efforts of a frail 12-year-old boy prevented another drowning, according to best reports of the tragedy.

The dead are Mrs. Hazel Sullivan, 25, Henderson Joe Cheers, 16, and Annie Mae Turner, 15, all of whom lived near Shallotte.

They had gone with three others for a swim not far from Brick Landing, which was near their home. After swimming for awhile on a sandbar farther out, the group had returned to the safety of the beach to escape the rushing tide.
