Request Will Be For Report, Student Drivers Are Unavailable

A delegation of citizens from Brunswick county will appear before the board of county commissioners here Monday morning to request that adult bus drivers be required to convey their children and from school.

As a result, a delegation from Brunswick county will appear before the state school commission here Thursday to see if it is possible to secure the help of that body in complying with the request. Members of the delegation will include Miss Annie May Woodside, county superintendent of schools, R. T. Woodside, chairman of the county board of education, J. M. Roach, chairman of the board of county commissioners, and R. I. Mintz, who will represent the county as attorney in the absence of S. E. Frink, county representative citizens expected to attend.

The action was the outgrowth of the death of little Rachel Jones two weeks ago as she walked in front of a school from which she had just graduated. A coroner's jury which investigated the death termed it an avoidable accident.

It was brought out at the hearing before the commissioners here Monday that not only was the age limit in favor of adult drivers being competent, but also because there are not enough boys driving driver's licenses in school to take care of the problem.

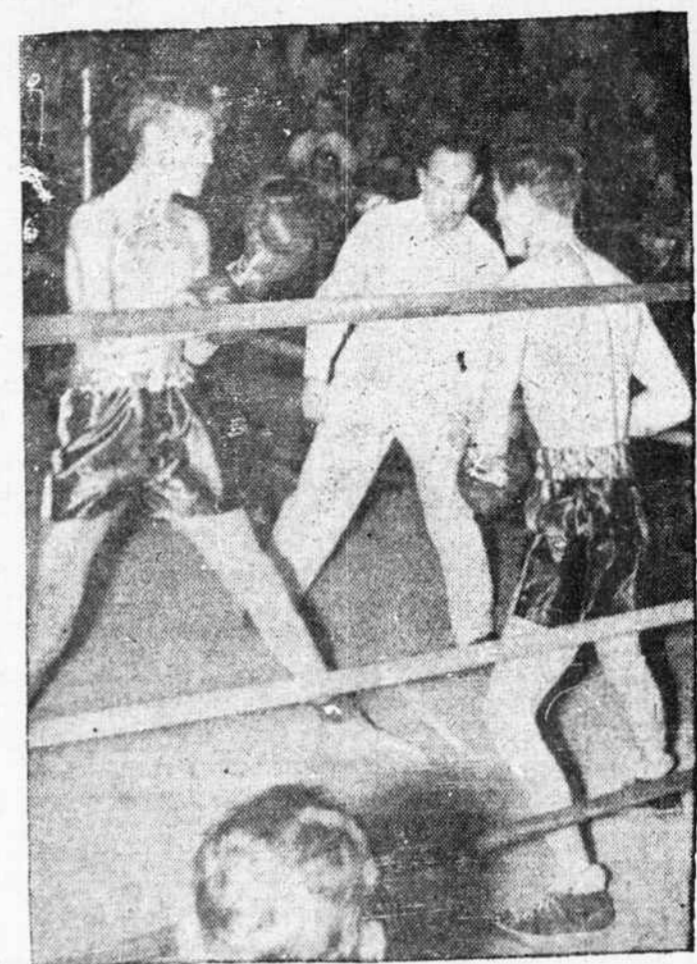
