of tobacco in British markets, according to British sources, are sufficient to meet demands of manufacturers for about two and one-half years at present rate of consumption. (Normal tobacco stocks on hand are usually sufficient for three and one-half years.) While restrictions on imports of American tobacco have been enforced since the beginning of hostilities in Europe, September, official British sources reported on January 10, a continuation of this would necessitate use by the public, after exhaustion of stocks now on hand, of cigars and smoking tobacco of "locally produced empire tobacco."

during the year North Carolina experiences a surplus of eggs yet there is general deficiency of high quality products most of the time. We need fewer poorly fed, overgrown or overbred chickens, light in weight, poorly feathered, scaly-legged and with feet that are not well fed, soft and heavy, uniformly colored, and of high market value. We need mixed-colored, dirty, heavy mixed-size eggs and high quality, strictly graded eggs. There is a light weight, poor quality egg going on the market that should be destroyed rather than sold for food. There are many egg eaters reaching the market that should be used instead of being sold. It is better to prevent a large percentage of the eggs from getting to market than it is to clean them. A few are dirty they
