WINANT TO LONDON WASHINGTON - New ambas-

sadors were named to Great Britain, China, Uruguay and Panama today in an extensive diplomatic shuffle which brought only one new comer, John G. Winant, into the service. Winant, former republican governor of New Hampshire and a labor expert, was nominated by President Roosevelt to succeed Jeseph P. Kennedy. Charles E. Gauss was nominated ambassador to China, succeeding Nelson T. Johnston, who in turn replaces Gauss as minister to Australia, and William Dawson was shifted from envoy to Panama to the newly created post of Ambassador to Uruguay. Edwin C. Wilson, now minister to Uruguay was named to the Panama ambassadorship
