BOND ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING \$67,500 WATER REFUNDING BONDS OF THE CITY OF SOUTHPORT

Be it ordained by the board of aldermen of the City of Southport as follows:

1. Bonds of the city shall be issued to the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$67,500 for the purpose of refunding by way of exchange the following valid outstanding bonded debt of the city, namely:

\$10,000 5 1/2 per cent Water and Sewer bonds, dated March 1, 1915 and payable March 1, 1925.

\$4,500 5 1/2 per cent Water bonds, dated October 1, 1917 and payable \$500 on the 1st of October in each of the years 1923 to 1941 inclusive, \$19,000 6 per cent Water and Sewer bonds, dated February 1, 1920 and payable February 1, 1930.

\$15,000 5 per cent Water Works and Sewer bonds, dated February 1, 1916 and payable February 1, 1936.

2. A statement of the debt of the city has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

3. This ordinance shall take effect on its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 12 day of June, 1941, and was first published, on the 18 day of June, 1941.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.

BOND ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING \$12,000 GENERAL REFUNDING BONDS OF THE CITY OF SOUTHPORT

2. A statement of the debt of the city has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

1. Bonds of the city shall be issued to the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$10,000 for the purpose of refunding by way of exchange the following valid outstanding bonded debt of the city, namely:

\$10,000 6 per cent Street Improvement and Funding bonds, dated August 1, 1925 and payable \$1,000 on the 1st of August in each of the years 1932 to 1942, inclusive.

\$6,500 5 per cent Hospital bonds, dated January 1, 1929 and payable \$500 on the 1st of January in each of the years 1932 to 1942, inclusive.

\$25,000 5 1/2 per cent Public Improvement bonds, dated December 1, 1922 and payable on the 1st of December \$1,000 in 1942 and \$2,000 in each of the years 1950, 1951 and 1952.

2. A statement of the debt of the city has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

3. This ordinance shall take effect on its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.
