Representative Bayard Clark has stated that he expects preliminary work to begin almost immediately at Southport, since a small portion of the funds needed for the developments already has been appropriated.

The legislation authorizes the construction of 59 section bases at a total cost of \$50,000,000. Of this sum, \$10,000,000 already has been voted, and the balance will

most likely be voted by Congress without delay.

Vessels ranging from converted yachts to small destroyers, will be based here, quarters and facilities for an average of 150 men must be provided at all ports as well.
