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Eight Citizens Named Members Of Committee

Will Advise And Assist In
Operation Of Rehabilitation
Program In Brunswick
County; Duties Are
Divided

DESIGNED TO HELP
POOR FARMERS

Members Of Advisory Com-
mittees Will Assist By
Giving Expert Advice
In Familiar Fields

Eight Brunswick county citizens have been named on committees to advise and assist in the operation of the rehabilitation and tenant purchase programs of the United States Department of Agriculture. W. M. Ginn, Brunswick county Supervisor for Farm Security Administration, has announced the appointments made by Vance E. Swift, State FSA Director at Raleigh.

The members appointed by Mr. Swift are:
W. C. Gore, farmer, Shallotte; Dennis R. Hewett, farmer, Supply; H. L. Clemmons, farmer, Supply; Hobson Kirby, merchant, Shallotte; W. B. Edwards, farmer, Shallotte; J. E. Dodson, county agent, Supply; C. C. Russ, county welfare officer, Southport; Miss Corrine Green, home economics teacher, Shallotte.

Mr. Ginn said that Mr. Gore, Mr. Hewett and Mr. Clemmons will serve as members of the subcommittee on the tenant purchase program; Mr. Kirby, Mr. Edwards and Mr. Clemmons will serve on the subcommittee for the Farm Debt Adjustments and tenure improvement work; Mr. Gore, Mr. Hewett and Mr. Clemmons will serve on the subcommittee for the rural rehabilitation program. Mr. Dodson, Mr. Russ and Miss Greene are members at large to advise on the various phases of assistance to low income families.

The tenant purchase program provides funds for the purchase of family type farms by qualified tenants under the Bankhead Jones Tenant Purchase Act. FSA rehabilitation loans are available to low income farm families, ineligible for credit elsewhere for the purchase of livestock, workstock, seed, fertilizer and equipment in accordance with carefully planned operation for the farm and home. About 50 farm families in Brunswick county have already been helped by this program.

The services of debt adjustment committees are available to all farmers as well as to FSA borrowers. The committees will assist creditors and farm debtors to reach an amicable adjustment of debts based on the ability to pay.

Mr. Ginn said better tenure arrangements is one of the most pressing needs in the rehabilitation of low income farm families. Farm Security Administration provides lease forms for long term leases to encourage conservation and better living on farms. This service is also available to all farmers in the county, as well as to FSA borrowers.

Farm Security Administration is the agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture which assists the low income farm families to take full advantage of the other services of the national

Land Planning Survey Will Be Held In County

Schedule Of Preliminary
Meetings Given, With
Plans To Go Into Every
Community In Brunswick
County

INFORMATION IS
BEING GATHERED

Boundaries Of Neighbor-
hoods, Number And Ac-
tivities Of Organi-
zations, Etc., Being
Determined

A Land Use Planning Survey will be made of Brunswick county, the first series of meetings to be held to definitely establish the boundary lines of neighborhoods, the number of churches, white and negro, number of schools, number of trading centers, P. T. A. organization, grange, farm bureau, 4-H Clubs, home demonstration Clubs, F. F. A. and other organizations in neighborhoods.

The first series of meetings will be followed by others, and other phases of the program will be taken up in the later meetings, all meetings will be presided over by a specialist from State College, Raleigh, who will have charge of the entire Land Use Planning Survey. The meetings will be entirely informal, no one is expected to dress up for them. It is hoped many citizens can arrange to attend the one nearest him.

Trouble At Shallotte Point
Results In One Man Being
Seriously Injured and
Others Also Hurt

Four Brunswick county men were injured Saturday night, one seriously, in a fight which occurred at Shallotte point.

Harris Gore, young Shallotte white man, was shot twice and is in a serious condition at Dasher Memorial Hospital. According to report he was shot by Deputy Sheriff Drew Long, who claimed that he fired his gun at Gore after the latter had banged him over the head with a rifle butt. Long was treated for severe lacerations and bruises about the head.

Another principal in the affray was Dought Tripp, who sustained head injuries when struck by a blackjack said to have been wielded by Deputy Sheriff Wainale Evans. The deputy received minor abrasions about the face.

Judge Makes First Ride In Airplane At Beach Monday

Father Uses Resuscitation Successfully On His Son

Captain Arthur J. Dasher Pulls Son From Water And
Uses Artificial Respiration To Save Life

As he managed to slowly pump the breath of life back into the body of his drowned son Tuesday afternoon, Captain Arthur J. Dasher had cause to be everlastingly thankful for his course in first aid.

Captain Dasher, master of the U. S. E. dredge Absecon, is here this week with his family visiting relatives. Tuesday afternoon his eight-year-old son, David, was in swimming with his cousins, Charles, Billie and Maxine Dasher, in the sound back of Swain beach when he was suddenly seized with cramps. Before he could again get control of himself he was in water over his head.

Excited by his cry for help, Billie and Maxine were soon in grave danger of drowning, and

probably would have been had not their older brother, Charles, hauled them to safety. It was at this moment that Captain Dasher reached the bathing place and failed to see his boy.

Diving into the water, he soon got his hands on his son and carried him to shore. The lad was unconscious, and it was not until the anguished father had spent ten minutes in resuscitation that David was breathing normally.

The youngster spent last night as a patient at Dasher Memorial Hospital, suffering chiefly from shock, and was able to be out again today apparently none the worse for his harrowing experience.

Tobacco Crop Reported Less Than In 1940

State Dept. Of Agriculture
Sees Smaller Tobacco
Crop In State This Year
And Reports Crop Later

According to estimates by the State Department of Agriculture the yield of tobacco in the border belt on an average is down about five percent below last season. The crop over the entire state is reported about two weeks later than usual. The crop in Columbus county is said to be somewhat below last year's bumper yield and head of the belt's yield. The State Department of Agriculture's report, as released Friday, follows:

North Carolina farmers indicate a 1941 flue-cured tobacco production of 497,180,000 pounds, four per cent below last season, grown on 502,000 acres or approximately one per cent above the 1940 acreage. J. J. Morgan, statistician of the State Department of Agriculture in Raleigh reported Friday.

"The condition of the flue-cured crop on July 1, reported at 77 per cent, indicated a yield per acre of 990 pounds compared with the record yield of 1,042 pounds harvested last season," Morgan said, basing his information on the Federal-State Crop Reporting service summary.

CROP LATER

"The crop at this time is around two weeks later than usual in practically all areas", he added. "Dry weather during the first of the season delayed trans-
