

Brunswick County Schools Ready For Opening Of Fall Terms On Monday Morning

County-Wide Meeting Of Teachers Called By Miss Annie May Woodside For Saturday At Southport School

THREE OUT OF FIVE FACILITIES COMPLETE
New Principals Will Be Located at Waccamaw And At Leland; All Other Schools Are Ready To Go

White and colored schools of Brunswick county open Monday morning for their fall term, according to announcement made last week by Miss Annie May Woodside, county superintendent, who urges parents to start their children on the first day and maintain regular attendance.

Teacher allotments are based on average daily attendance, reports out Miss Woodside, who is anxious for this county to have the full teacher strength to which it is entitled.

Completed facilities have been announced for Southport, Bolivia and Shallotte schools but a few last minute arrangements are to be made at Leland and Waccamaw.

There will be new principals at each of these schools. H. D. Wright, former principal at Leland, goes to Waccamaw and O. C. Burton, former principal at Hampstead, will replace T. R. Barrett as principal at Leland.

There will be a county-wide meeting of teachers at Southport high school Saturday morning at 8:00 o'clock and a meeting for colored teachers at Brunswick county Training school at 2 o'clock that afternoon.

Miss Woodside says that there will be nine new school buses in operation in this county this fall, and announces that all schedules will operate on Eastern Daylight Saving Time until September 28, when the nation switches back to standard time.

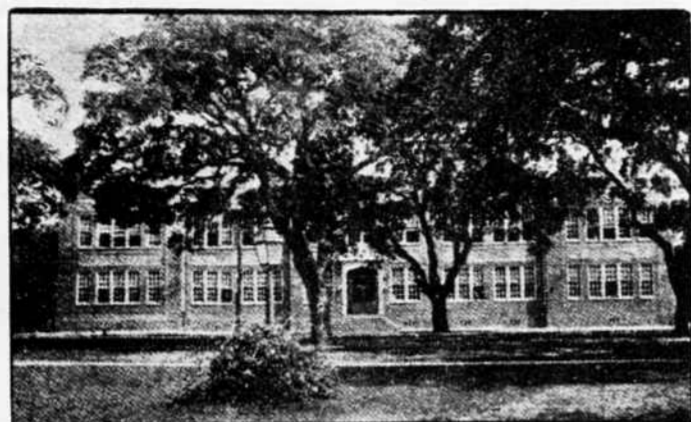
BIG CATCHES

Hundreds Expected To Visit Forestry Train

All-Southern Forestry Demonstration Train Will Be At Wilmington All Day Long Next Wednesday

COUNTY CITIZENS MUCH INTERESTED
Extent Of Timber Area And Enterprizes In This Area Contribute To Interest Of Train

The first all-Southern Forestry Demonstration Train being operated by the Seaboard Air Line Railway in cooperation with the North Carolina State Division of Forestry, the Extension Forester at N. C. State College, and the North Carolina Forestry Ass'n., and the United States Forest Service, is scheduled to stop at Wilmington on Wednesday, September 10th, according to Charles A. Gillett, Industrial Forester for the Railroad. The cars carrying the exhibits will be spotted near the S. A. L. Freight Station. The exhibits will be open from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM, standard time.

The first car shows, in a very interesting manner, the importance and value of the forests to every class of person. The second car shows the damage caused by forest fires, and the necessity of protecting the forests from this enemy. The third car will be used for motion pictures and for lecture purposes. The exhibits are both interesting and educational and are free to everyone.

The Forestry Demonstration Train is being operated over the entire 4,500 miles of rail in the Seaboard system, taking the exhibits into the six southeastern States of South Carolina, North Carolina, Virginia, Georgia, Alabama and Florida.

Everyone is cordially invited to visit the Forestry exhibition train when it makes its stop at Wilmington.

Investigate New Bridge Project
The State Highway Commission has made preliminary estimates on the construction of a bridge across the inland waterway to Fort Caswell and Long Beach. Owing to the present limited personnel of the highway engineering force, many men having left to engage in government work, a detailed investigation and action is delayed for the moment, according to a letter received this week by W. B. Keziah, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, from Chairman L. B. Prince.

That a new and modern bridge is being investigated is encouraging, even if the time for its construction is at the moment uncertain.

Outdoor Writers Plan To Return For Fall Meet

President J. Hammond Brown Will Head Party Comprised Of Members Of OWAA For Return Visit To These Parts In November

LARGER GROUP THAN LAST YEAR

No Definite Arrangements Have Yet Been Made Regarding Program Of Entertainment Of These Visitors

President J. Hammond Brown of the Outdoor Writers Association of America has definitely set November 1st to 5th as the date for this year's meeting of a group of the members of the association at Southport. The meeting here last year was for the officers and directors. This year's gathering will be more of a spontaneous meeting, some of the officers and directors and several widely known hunting and fishing editors being scheduled to come pretty much on their own for several days of hunting and fishing.

Fourteen men comprised last year's gathering. This year the number may run to 20 or more, including some of the best known hunting and fishing editors in the country. In a letter to W. B. Keziah, Monday, President Brown said that he was rounding up a most outstanding bunch of outdoor and hunting and fishing editors.

In addition to the writers, it is expected to have one or more news reel companies represented with their movie cameras. And there will, of course, be press cameras in abundance.

No definite plans have been made yet regarding where the men will be quartered. In his letter President Brown asked that rates be secured on rooms and meals at Fort Caswell and also at Long Beach, also what accommodations might be available at Southport. This data is being gathered up by the Chamber of Commerce and mailed him this week.

RALEIGH.—The lowly collard—wilted in the sun, dropping underneath the frosty hand of winter—has been lifted to a position of importance on the menu of mankind by Dr. Ernest A. Branch, Director of the State Board of Health's Division of Oral Hygiene. It is not only good for the stomach, but also good for the teeth, he pointed out, because collards are rich in vitamins A and C. "The calcium content of the collard places it among the foods that help to build good teeth and bones," he declared.

Board Asks For Road Extension

Commissioners Ask Highway Commission To Extend Pavement Of Moore Street In Anticipation Of Project

Members of the Board of County Commissioners have passed a resolution asking the State Highway Commission to extend the paving of Moore Street in Southport across Fiddlers Drain, thence turning to the left and paving out to the shell road and back to a point intersecting the highway.

Escape Artist Is Recaptured

Edgar Henderson Is Captured While Swimming In Neuse River Near Jacksonville; Taken To State's Prison

Capt. E. A. Marlowe, superintendent of N. C. Prison Camp 303 near Whiteville, from which Edgar Henderson, Brunswick county escapee artist made good a daring bid for freedom a fortnight ago, reported Wednesday Wednesday that Henderson has been recaptured.

Mr. Marlowe said that he has been informed by authorities from Onslow county that Deputy Sheriff Millis made the capture of the escapee last Wednesday. The officer is said to have gone to the home of Henderson's stepmother near Jacksonville in search of the missing convict. He was informed there that Henderson was down in the Neuse river swimming.

At the approach of the officer, Henderson is said to have started swimming rapidly downstream, but Millis hastily procured a motorboat and overtook the fleeing convict.

Mr. Marlowe said that he was informed that Henderson was first placed in the Onslow county jail at Jacksonville, and subsequently, because it was feared that he might attempt a break there, was transferred to the supposedly escape-proof New Hanover county bastille.

Henderson has since been transferred to State's Prison in Raleigh to serve the remainder of his (continued on page four)

Meet Champion Snake-Killer

D. P. Andrews of Mill Branch probably qualifies as the rattlesnake killing champion of Brunswick county upon the basis of having disposed of 10 of these deadly reptiles this summer.

The Andrews farm is near Wet Ash swamp, which seems to be the harboring place for these deadliest of snakes, and Andrews killed three of them in one day. The largest one in his collection measured over 6 feet in length and carried 16 rattles.

Andrews says that while he has plenty of respect for these fellows, only one came close to biting him. That was one he almost stepped on before he heard the buzz of his rattles.

Scientist Guest Of Bob Godfrey

Harvard University Man Is Finding Wonderful Forms Of Plant Life In Bottom Of Orton Pond

Bob Godfrey, of the Orton Plantation gardens has had as his guest for more than a week Dr. Walter Hodge, herbarian at Harvard College. In search of plant life, the two have been confining themselves to the borders and depths of the Orton pond where they are said to have been making some unexpected and rare finds.

Persons who are acquainted with the pond are not surprised at anything found in the waters. To cover more than 1,300 acres for more than a century with fresh water, and to keep such area continuously under water, is bound to result in new and, sometimes, startling plant growth. Another year should see the Orton pond and its borders discovered as being a regular treasure house for the botanists and herbarians.

Changes Made In Defense Council

Expect REA To Help Conserve Supply Of Food

Gigantic New Program Being Planned For The Possible Placing Of Projects Over The Country

TWO FROM AREA ARE ATTENDING MEETING

Dr. Bishop, Superintendent, And R. B. Mallard, Attorney, Are Attending Conference In Washington

Dr. E. D. Bishop, superintendent of the Brunswick Electric Membership Corporation, and R. B. Mallard, of Tabor City, attorney for the same organization, left today for Washington, D. C., to attend a conference there Friday and Saturday which will deal with the subject: "Rural Electrification and Food for Defense".

They are attending the conference at the invitation of Harry Slattery, Rural Electrification Administrator.

Before leaving for the conference, Dr. Bishop said that the conference was expected to consider and design plans for dehydrating, canning and preserving all kinds of fruits and vegetables. He said that the REA would come in for the possible financing of the necessary equipment to carry out the program.

The local co-operative, Dr. Bishop said, which is the organization in each community such as the Brunswick Electric Membership Corporation in Columbus and Brunswick, would be asked to make the necessary installation as their contribution to this part of the defense program.

Dr. Bishop was not in possession of all the facts regarding the proposed program, and said that the conference had been called for the purpose of working out the various details of such a plan.

Expect Soldiers Here This Week

One Thousand Expected To Occupy Camp At Long Beach While Another Group Of About 500 Go To Gause Landing

A group of around one thousand soldiers from Ft. Bragg is expected to arrive Friday at Long Beach to spend the week end. A camp site is being arranged in the woods this side of the bridge leading to the beach proper.

Meanwhile, it is expected that the usual contingent of about five hundred men will make their week-end excursion from Ft. Bragg to Gause Landing for the week end. Material is already on hand for erecting bridges and walk-ways for the convenience of the men at that point.
