Rev. A. L. Brown, in charge of the Junior Red Cross program for the county, reports that splendid response has come from the schools of the county. So far, Southport is the first to make a complete report, but the local school is 100-percent.

The conference picked Goldsboro for its 1942 meeting, to be held in St. Pauls church. Action was taken designed to increase the revenues of the Methodist orphanage in Raleigh, which cares for 300 children. A levy on churches of six percent of what they raised last year was approved, exclusive of sums raised for buildings and to pay debts. The orphanage, it was pointed out, under the old system, has been operating under a deficit.

The longest debate of the conference came Thursday when the report of a commission on worldwide service and finance, recommending that salaries of seven district superintendents remain at \$4,500 a year was being acted upon. After a heated discussion, an amendment to reduce the salaries to \$4,000 a year was defeated.

Some of the speakers during the closing days of the conference included Dr. Frank S. Hickman,

who preached at the worship service Thursday afternoon at Abundant Life."

Dr. T. D. Ellis, of Louisville, Ky., general secretary of the church extension, spoke at Thursday morning session. After that afternoon, the Brotherhood and the Methodist Orphanage banquet were held.
