Navy Jobs Are Open To Negroes

RALEIGH.—The Navy Department has opened the ranks of the "Seabees," hard-hitting naval construction regiments, to Negroes.

Lt. C. B. Neely, officer-in-charge of Navy recruiting in North Carolina, said that special Seabee units are being formed completely of Negroes, and qualified men of the Negro race are eligible to receive petty officer ratings in the Naval Reserve.

Applicants in the State will be selected by Lt. (jg) W. J. Wray, recruiting officer for the Bureau of Yards and Docks, who will spend 11 days in North Carolina interviewing skilled and unskilled Negro workers. Lieutenant Wray will be located at the Raleigh Navy Recruiting Station on June 15, 16, 17, 18, 24, 25, 26, 27 and 28.

Farmers Expect Good Grain Crop

Threshing Machine Reports Expected To Be The Most Complete In Many Years, Census Supervisor Predicts

RALEIGH.—Small grain farmers registering as owners and operators of combines and threshing machines indicate their threshing reports this season will be the most complete in many years, W. T. Garriss, census supervisor of the State Department of Agriculture, said today.

"Meanwhile, the number of combines, being operated in the State has been increased materially which indicates farmers are turning more and more to the use of farm machinery in an effort to offset labor shortages," he added.

Garriss emphasized the necessity of registering combines and threshing machines with the County Registers of Deeds as required by statute. He termed the keeping of accurate threshing records "a distinct contribution to the war effort."

North Carolina's prospects for small grain crops this season have been reported by the Federal-State Crop Reporting Service as "favorable at this time." The May 1 report indicates:

Wheat—Indicated yield, 14 bushels per acre; acreage for harvest, 494,000; indicated production, 6,916,000 bushels.

Rye—Indicated yield, 9.5 bushels; acreage, 49,000 or eight per cent under last year; total production indicated, 428,000. A larger portion of the crop than usual is being used for soil building purposes.

Oats—47 per cent of the crop was "spring sown" compared with 49 per cent last year. "Moderately good" crop in prospect.

Experts Search For Tuber Moth

RALEIGH.—North Carolina has been designated by the federal government as one of the 16 states to make a survey to determine the extent of the damage done by the "potato tuber moth," the larvae of which has caused serious economic loss to Irish potato farmers in some sections of the Nation, C. H. Brannon, chief of the entomology division of the State Department of Agriculture, reported today.

Two members of the entomology division's staff—J. A. Harris and Dr. D. L. Wray—are now in the field to determine the presence of

the moth in the commercial potato areas. They will concentrate their survey in Camden, Currituck and Pasquotank counties while other sections will be covered by representatives of the United States Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine.

1943 CROP INSURANCE PLAN TO BE DISCUSSED

Plans for the 1943 cotton crop insurance program will be discussed at a meeting of agricultural and business leaders of North Carolina and Virginia to be held at Raleigh on June 18, E. Y. Floyd, State AAA executive assistant, of N. C. State College, announced yesterday.

The meeting will be held in the State College Y. M. C. A. Building, beginning at 9 a. m., under the sponsorship of the State AAA Committee. G. T. Scott, chairman of the committee, will preside.

Also present at the session will be officials of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation at Washington who will outline the background and operation of the 1943 program. A tentative plan for the 1943 cotton crop insurance program will be advanced, and suggestions for proposed changes by those present will be discussed.

"This meeting is important to the cotton farmer," Mr. Floyd said. "At this time, growers and others interested in stabilizing the income of cotton producers will be given an opportunity to bring up for discussions any problems they encountered in the program last year, and any changes they would like to see made in the program for 1943."

He said a series of state meetings is being held this year in lieu of a national conference on crop insurance.

He declared those attending the meeting may file written statements which will be considered along with oral testimony.

Cotton crop insurance was offered farmers for the first time last year, and more than 11,000 North Carolina farmers insured their crops. The insurance affords protection against damage from causes beyond control of the grower for either fifty or seventy-five percent of the farm's average yield.
