LIST YOUR REAL and PERSONAL POPERTY DURING THE MONTH OF JANUARY

All property owners and tax payers are required by law to return to the List Takers for Taxation for the year 1943, all the Real Estate, Personal Property, Etc., which they own on the first day of January.

All male persons between the ages of 21 and 50 years must list for Poll Tax during the same time, except those exempt by law for physical disability.

All persons to whom the foregoing applies who fail to list their Real and Personal Prop-erty, and/or Poll Tax will be guilty of a Misdemeanor and subject to fine or imprisonment upon conviction.

Local list takers will post notices of appointments in public places-Watch For Same.
