

Dim-Out Rules For Area Given Full Explanation

D. Bishop Says That Out-Advertising Signs Must Go, As Must Other Lights Shining Horizontally

TO HEADLIGHTS TO BE HALF-SHADED

Motorists Have Shown Willingness To Cooperate With Regulations; Street Lights Are Shaded

D. Bishop, chairman of the Brunswick County Defense Council, has explained certain features of the dim-out regulations. All types of outdoor lighting, including street lights, service lights, etc., must be so shaded that the source of the light will not be visible on the road. Service stations and other similar places may use outdoor lights of low wattage, provided these lights are properly shaded, or their source is hidden by an overhanging canopy.

With regard to dim-out regulations as they affect motor transportation, the same rules are being followed in this county as have been prescribed for military vehicles at a nearby base. This provides for one-half the headlights to be painted over with black paint, the vehicle to operate on low beam lights. This may be done in all areas except where the lights are directly exposed to the open sea, in which case 15-mile per hour regulations and operation with parking lights is the rule.

Helpful Hints On Income Tax

Second In Series Of Articles Will Assist Persons In Preparing Income Tax Report Before Deadline

Person subject to the Federal income tax must report their income to the Government on forms, or blanks, prescribed by regulations. These forms are obtainable from any Collector of Internal Revenue, and generally from any bank. Special forms are designated for corporations, for partnership, for trusts and fiduciaries, and for nonresident aliens. Farmers who keep no books of account on the accrual method must attach a special schedule to their return (Form 1040F). For individuals, two forms are used, depending upon the amount and source of income to be reported.
