"Extension of the closing date to December 31 will serve as a distinct advantage to many farmers, particularly in carrying out late practices such as seeding winter legumes ad spreading lime and phosphate," he said. "Many farmers this year will be delayed considerably in carrying out their normal farming operations because of a shortage of labor, and this change will allow them time to complete their practices after most crops are har-

the end of the calendar year." For the current year, Patten said, farmers will have a total periodoffourteen months in which to carry out practices for which units may be earned under the 1943 AAA program.

## On Income Tax

les Will Assist Person Preparing Income Tax Report Before Deadline

Person subject to the Federal income tax must report their income to the Government on forms, or blanks, prescribed by regulations. These forms are obtainable from any Collector of Internal Revenue, and generally from any bank. Special forms are designated for corporations, for partnership, for trusts and fiduciaries, and for nonresident aliens. Farmers who keep no books of account on the accrual method must at tach a special schedule to their return (Form 1040F). For individuals, two forms are used, depending upon the amount and source of income to be reported.

Form 1040. This form is intended for general use of individuals who are citizens of the United States, or residents in this country, whether citizens or not. It contains spaces to show the amount of income from various sources, deductions allowable, exemptions and credits, and computation of tax liability. As most of the items require some explanation in order to be allowable, the form also contains appropriate schedules to show in more detail how the income or the deductions are determined.

Form 1040A. This is a simplified report, which may, at the op-tion of the taxpayer who makes his return on the cash basis, be filed instead of form 1040 by citizens and residents whose gross income was \$3,000 or less during 1942, provided all this income consists wholly or one or more of the following: salary, wages, dividends, interest, or annunities. In using this form it is necessary only to enter the amount of gross income as shown, deduct the credit allowable for dependents, and insert the appropriate amount of tax in accordance with one's personal exemption status, as shown on the table on the reverse of the form. This form has no chtries for deductions allowable, since the taxes indicated in the table on the back of the form are computed after taking info account what have been considered average deductions for persons (continued on page four)
