At that time a combination of Dewey and Morgan took over for the guards-

men and carried the ball to a 38-28 point victory. CLEAN-UP

Dear Sir: I am speaking as a citizen of Brunswick county who holds a position whereby I touch practically all sections of our county. I come, therefore, not only as a citizen, but as a preacher whose desire is to help the people of my county. So I cannot help passing on to our people of something about our grand jury.

A. The kind of Men On Grand Jury.

The first thing concerning the grand jury is the type of men they are. I get this first - hand from one who served on the jury. He said, "I considered it an honor to serve with such a splendid group of gentlemen." He then said that during the days the jury met that he did not hear any profanity, nor anything that was offensive. Not only that, but at the suggestion of one member of the jury, they opened with a word of prayer, for each member is a professing Christian, being a member of a Christian church. I think that the people of our county are proud of this fact, and are encouraged.

B. What They Want To Do. No member of the jury is permitted to talk about the cases

tried. But we can get the drift of what they desire to do. It is to do everything within their power to make our county a cleaner and better county. That is, especially, to clean up places of business that degrade our communities and county. Now that is what they want to do. What can we the people of our county, do to help?

C. What We Can Do To Help.

May I suggest, first, that the sentiment of the people of our county be expressed in no uncertain terms, so that the grand jury will know that back of their desire to clean up is the approval of the people of our county. Then, second, I would suggest that we put into the hands of the grand jury evidence upon which they can work to carry out their program of cleaning up. Do not be afraid; speak, if that will make your community and county a better place. Why do I, a preacher, mention this? It is not because I want to see anyone get in trouble. It is not to cause strife and hard feelings. But I say it for the sake of our homes, of our young people. Every place of prostitution, every "booze" joint, every place that leads away from truth, purity, sobriety, honesty and upright living ought to be put out of business, and the way to do it is for the people of our county to rise in wrath against these things, and through the channels of government, wipe them out.

I am thinking of the young people! And I am against immorality, against drunkenness, against uncleanness. I love people; I live only to preach the gospel of Christ because that is the only power capable of changing hearts. I am not entering politics. A preacher's place is out of the political areas. But in all issues that are moral the preacher and the church of the Christ should set the standard of right and wrong, so that the people will follow in the way that is right. Therefore, in all issues of our county I am going to speak up and say, "People, only Christ can save a man's soul and change a man's life; but we of the county should do all within our power to keep our county clean." So let us do all within our power now to hasten the clean-up that is long overdue.

In order that income taxpayers may have the benefit of assistance in preparing their Federal income tax returns for the year of 1942, Raymond L. Christman, United States deputy collector of internal revenue has announced that he will observe the following itinerary during the income tax period:

- County Tax Office, Southport, February 19th.
- Postoffice building, Shallotte, February 20th.
- Postoffice building, Whiteville, February 22th, 23th, and 24th.
- Postoffice building, Tabor City, February 25th.
- R. R. Koons' Office, Chadbourne, February 26th.
- Sheriff's Office, Elizabethtown, February 27th.
- Postoffice, Wilmington, March 1 through 15th.

MUST FILE RETURN FOR INCOME TAX

(Continued from page 1) Members of Congress, are exempt from filing returns.

Moreover, all income from whatever source, unless specifically excluded by statute, must be reported in the return. The types of income specifically exempt are listed in the instructions accompanying the return form.

A person whose gross income does not exceed \$3000, and consists wholly of salary, wages, dividends, interest, or annuities,

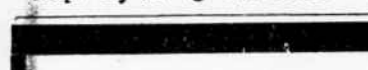
may make a Simplified Return of Form 1040A, in which the tax due may be readily ascertained by reference to a table contained in the form.

A husband and wife living together on July 1 of the taxable year may file separate Simplified Returns if the gross income of each is from the prescribed sources and does not exceed \$3000. They may file a single joint return on that form if their combined income is from the prescribed sources and does not exceed \$3000. A taxpayer may, however, file a Simplified Return if the other spouse files a return on Form 1040.
