County Under Potato Order

WFA Extends Control Over Shipments In North Carolina And Other States; Effective Here June 7th

WASHINGTON. — The War Food Administration extended Friday control over potato shipments from 90 additional counties in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia, for the announced purpose of enabling the armed forces to obtain essential supplies, and of providing equitable distribution of military purchases among the areas, individual growers and shippers.

North Carolina counties included in the order are: Northampton, Halifax, Martin, Pitt, Greene, Wayne, Johnston, Harnett, Cumberland, Robeson, Hertford, Gates, Bertie, Washington, Beaufort, Craven, Lenoir, Duplin, Sampson, Bladen, Columbus, Brunswick, Camden, Currituck, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Chowan, Tyrrell, Dare, Hyde, Pamlico, Carteret, Jones, Onslow, Pender, and New Hanover.

The WFA described the areas as the most important Southeastern producing districts. The control plan already has been in operation in Maine, and in five counties in Florida and Alabama. It provides all shippers must obtain a permit before shipping by truck or rail.

The order becomes effective in Florida, Georgia and South Carolina Saturday and will be effective in North Carolina on June 7 and in Virginia on June 14. Permits will be issued through WFA offices in Hastings, Fla.; Lexley, Ala.; Florence and Meggett, S. C.; Goldsboro and Washington, N. C.; and Norfolk and Onley, Virginia.

House Cleaning Victory Style: War needs absorb many household cleaning chemicals but you can manage with soap, water, and facts.

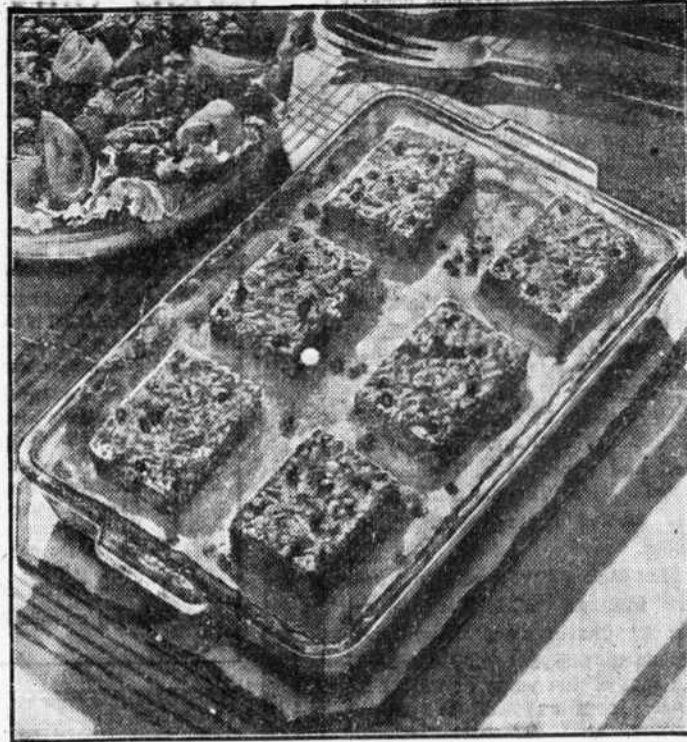
You'll have to go easy on the wax coatings you spread over your linoleum and floors. The War Production Board has limited the amount to be produced for use on floors, because carnauba wax from Brazil and gum kauri from New Zealand are both used in floor and furniture wax.

Wartime soaps may not give suds as fast as the soap you have been using but just remember pre-war soap contained coconut oil, an important product. Now domestic oils such as cottonseed, soybean, flax, and peanut are being used and they don't make soap that lathers quickly.

Household ammonia, diluted with water (4 tablespoons to a gallon), makes a good solution for washing windows but ammonia is also one of the most fundamental requirements for explosives.

Fathers To Be Last Drafted

Single Men And Childless Married Men Will Be Called Before There Are Any Fathers Drafted, Jonas Declares

CHARLOTTE. — As long as single men and childless married men are listed with selective service boards as being subject to call, no fathers in North Carolina are to be called into the armed services, Maj. Charles R. Jonas, of Raleigh, representing the North Carolina Selective Service headquarters, told draft boards of four counties here.

Jonas, in speaking to draft board representatives from Mecklenburg, Union, Cabarrus and Stanly counties, emphasized two points:

- 1. All cases should be reviewed less married men are left in civilian life after fathers are called, except for vital reasons. 2. Boards should impress on employers that deferments of single and childless married men will be renewed only in extreme cases and that replacements for them are becoming imperative.
