WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Any doubts lurking in the minds of administrative agencies that Members of Congress are not in touch with their constituents were dissipated this week. The telephones from the Capitol to the downtown offices were busy with demands for information on projects in which the home folks had manifested keen interest during the last three weeks when Congress had a holiday recess. Not even the annual report of the President with its broad program detracted from the importance of these chores on behalf of the voters. Spokesmen for the pressure groups, particularly the labor unions and the organized farmers, are checking with the returning legislators to ascertain what changes were wrought in their sentiments as a result of their visits in their bailiwicks. It is the hometown views which carry more weight in shaping the lawmaker's voting tendencies than the persuasive arguments of

the professional agents camp in their offices here.

The trade unions and some military groups are taking soundings on Capitol Hill to ascertain the prospects for the Austin-Wadsworth compulsory service bill for drafting civilians for war work. It is expected that a measure of this sort is about due as a direct aftermath of the bitter controversy provoked by the threatened rail strike of a fortnight ago. The authorized government by an unidentified official about the effect on military operations of the government's seizure of the transportation systems has provoked so much hostility toward trade unions' tactics that Congress cannot evade the issue of drastic strike-controls. The existing Connally anti-strike act is considered a nifty-pamby stop gap legislative device not worth enforcement—assuming the Department of Justice would be willing to give force to the statutory prohibitions against labor disturbances in wartime.

Several legislators having a heavy percentage labor votes in their constituency are frankly worried at developments. The rail

labor question has been revived and criminal practices of the prohibition era. The House members are now confronted with a concrete proposal upon which they must take a position. And not one incumbent looks at the future with any degree of job-security on Uncle Sam's payroll. They have only to look over the voting records of their predecessors in the "Early Twenties" to realize the political casualties that followed election skirmishes over legalized liquor.

Large scale landing of American troops on the second European front will have a major influence on the output of articles for civilian use. Despite the so-called "cut-backs" or curtailment of war goods, the increased demand for articles used in warfare may change the whole picture for the non-combatant segment of our population. The railroads and motor-transportation systems are destined to have first call on any replacement and maintenance equipment with consumers of other goods far down the list.

If the metal situation improves it is believed that production of electric refrigerators will be an early item for the public whenever civilian production is authorized. Military reverses on a large scale means that production of war materials, now curtailed or even terminated, would have to be resumed and radically increased. In most cases of cut-backs, standby facilities are retained against this possibility. Vitality important is the policy which will hold skilled labor when production is reduced on a few campaign year. Both sides are mustering their arguments with the "wets" citing the gangsteres solution.
