Leland Man Is Miss Marie Moore, daughter of Wounded In Action

This Years Crop Local Man Is Mentioned In Tobacco Market Of Tobacco Is Of Saturday Evening Post Story

Lieutenant Churchill Bragaw Frequently Mentioned In Last Week's Installment Of Commando Kelly Story Which Deals With Occurrances Just A Month Before Captain Was Killed

In last week's issue of the Saturday Evening Post the Commando Kelly story, now running serially, made continuous mention of Lieutenant Churchill Bragaw of Company K. The story last week dealt with events during the month of December, 1943. At that time young Bragaw was still a Lieutenant. In an event occurring the day before Christmas he was especially mentioned. Oddly enough, Lieutenant Bragaw wrote a friend in Southport on the day before Christmas, saying he hoped he would not have to fight on Christmas day.

On Christmas day he was wounded, sent to a field hospital and remained there eight days receiving treatment. He rejoined his command as a Captair and a few days thereafter, on the 22nd of January he was killed while gallantly leading his command in storming a hill against German machine gun fire. Captain Bragaw was the son of Mrs. Helen G. Bragaw, of Southport.

From scores of letters received from men and officers in Captain Bragaw's command it is evident he stood very high in the esteem of his men. Relatives of many of these men have written from all parts of the country, telling Mrs. Bragaw of having received letters commending him. In many cases letters to relatives have been forwarded to the Captain's mother. Recently the whole company formerly commanded by Captain Bragaw united and each contributed one dollar, which they sent to his mother with the request that she use it as their contribution of esteem toward the purchase of any Memorial she might desire to have for their former commander.


