Less than one month after the war began, he continued, approximately 7,500 local rationing boards, manned by 20,000 volunteer workers, were receiving ap-

This original army of 20,000 volunteers soon increased to 76,-000, and another 200,000 men and women volunteered to assist the local boards regularly, he said. These volunteers - merchants, bankers, factory workers, doctors housewives, high school boys and maimed for life by a disease of girls, teachers, office workers, and farmers-gave a specified lar weekly schedule.

With everything but sugar now off the rationing list, OPA has changed the official name of its local organizations to Area Price Control Boards, Johnson said.

The district director stressed that while goods are scarce and in great demand these Price Control Boards will greatly need the support of the volunteers who worked so efficiently on price control during the war.
