CONSERVATION PRACTICES 1946 AAA Program

Approval of County Committeemen Required For Each Practice. See them for Specifications.

I LIMING MATERIALS. Applying standard ground limestone, or equivalent material, to farm land. CREDIT RATE: \$5.00 per ton.

2. PHOSPHATE: Applying phosphate materials to

CREDIT RATE:—4 cents per pound of available P205. This rate is equivalent to 80 cents per 100 pounds of 20 per cent super-phosphate. For purposes of payment, 200 pounds of basic slag will be considered equivalent to 100 pounds of 20 per cent super phosphate. of 20 per cent super-phosphate.

3. POTASH .- Applying potash materials to eligible

CREDIT RATE:-31/2 cents per pound of available K20. This rate is equivalent to \$2.10 per 100 pounds of 60 percent muriate of potash.

5. WINTER COVER CROPS: Establishing a winter cover crop in the fall of 1946 from seedlings of crimson clover, vetch, Austrian winter peas, annual ryegrass a mixture consisting solely of these crops, or a full seeding of one or more of these legumes with a small grain nurse crop.

CREDIT RATE: Payment will be made on the pounds of seed (cleaned seed equivalent) used at the set rates. Consult your Committeemen.

6. SMALL GRAINS: Establishing a satisfactory winter cover from seeding of wheat, oats, barley, rye, or mix-ture of these crops, made in the fall of 1945, and not mowed for hay or combined, \$1.50 per acre.

7. SUMMER LEGUMES ALONE. Establishing a summer cover crop from seedings of soybeans from which seed is not harvested, cowpeas, velvet beans, crotalaria, or mix-ture of these legumes. \$1.00 per acre.

10. PERMANENT PASTURE: Establishing a permanent pasture by seeding adapted pasture grasses and legumes. Payment rates under this practice are based on clean seed equivalent. Consult your County Committeemen.

11. PASTURE IMPROVEMENT: Reseeding pasture with perennial grasses, perennial legumes or mixtures containing perennial grasses or perennial legumes. Payment will be made on the pound of seed used at the rates shown under practice 10. under practice 10.

21. OPEN DITCH DRAINAGE. Constructing or enlarging drainage ditches (including lateral and lead ditches) for which proper outlets are provided.—8 cents per cubic yard of dirt removed, not to exceed 8 cents per lineal foot. Consult your Community Committeemen.

22. TILE DRAINAGE. Installation of field drain tile on farmland:

a. 4-inch tile—5 cents per linear foot of tile.
b. 6-inch tile—8½ cents per linear foot of tile.
c. 8-inch tile—15 cents per linear foot of tile.
Consult your Community Committeemen.

FOREST FIRE PROTECTION. Constructing firebreaks:-

7 feet in width—\$2.00 per 1,000 linear feet. 15 feet in width—\$5.00 per 1,000 linear feet. Consult your Community Committeemen.

25. IMPROVING STANDS: Thinning stands of trees, removing underisable trees, or prunning according to specifications, \$3.00 per acre.
