Caswell For Recreation

From reliable sources we learn that the Department of Conservation and Development is in dead earnest about acquiring the Navy Section Base at Fort Caswell as an occupational park area.

There may be some ways in which local citizens can assist with this transfer of the government-owned property to state-ownership, and we suggest that it may be a good plan to lend whatever assistance we can.

As we see it, one of the finest things to which this section can look forward is development of its recreational and tourist attractions. The State of North Carolina is extremely recreation-conscious now, and we shall be happy to see the Caswell project included as part of their over-all effort.

Club Building

Through the sponsorship of the Southport Lions Club, the City of Southport has purchased from the Federal Works Agency the USO Club building and furniture.

It is a fine thing that it has been possible to work out a plan which will permit the continued use by the citizens of this community of this building, but the mere matter of its purchase fails to settle all of the problems

involved. First of all, there is the matter of upkeep; and since the Lion's Club is a non-profit organization that operates on a modest budget, some plan for financing this service must be worked out. Second, since it is the hope of all persons concerned that the building will be looked upon and will be used as a community center, there is also the matter of responsibility on the part of all citizens to see to it that neither the building nor its contents are wantonly damaged.

This building can serve an important place in our community life for a long time to come, but it will require the interest and cooperation of all the citizens and all of their organizations.

Here's An Idea

During the war you heard much about the walkie-talkie, a two-way radio telephone that rendered valuable service for on-the-scene communications during battle. The Navy used a similar set called the T.B.Y. about which you have heard much less, but which was just as effective.

One of the principal uses to which this equipment was put by the Navy was for ship-to-ship voice communications when in convoy. Because of the peculiarities of very high frequency, it was possible to use these sets even when enemy submarines were in the vicinity.

But what we are getting around to is to suggest a very practical use for these sets which now are a part of the government's surplus property inventory. We believe that it would be to the mutual advantage of the boatmen and the management ashore to be in contact at regular intervals throughout the day when shrimping operations are in progress. Operators of the shrimp houses could keep a pretty close tally on what to expect in the way of production, and could make arrangements for the necessary help. And the boatmen, now at Oak Island Coast Guard Station is not manned for rescue activities, could send out a call for help in case of a break-down.

The care and maintenance of T.B.Y. sets is relatively simple and inexpensive, and the range is sufficient to cover the distance from Southport to the shrimping grounds.

PUBLIC WELFARE ACT TO PROVIDE MORE BENEFITS

public assistance. For example, the quota for Old Age Assistance is 200—the county can have but 200 people receiving OAA at any one time. Brunswick County and the State of North Carolina do not have sufficient money to appropriate more money to help more people. This bill would make it possible for an increase in quotas. Federal funds will be available for more adequate care of assist-

ance recipients with direct payments to doctors and institutions. With the growing problem of the chronically ill this will help meet medical care needs.

North Carolina counties pay approximately 70-percent of the costs of public welfare administration. The bill will permit the Federal government to match state and county expenditures for social services, other than financial grants, on the same basis as it matches assistance grants.

The bill provides for unified administration of Federally aided welfare programs which will mean unification of the present welfare programs of the Federal Security Agency and the Children's Bureau.

"It is urgent that we actively support this bill which if passed will make possible a much more extensive public welfare program in North Carolina," says Charles F. White, Brunswick County Welfare Superintendent. "Our County Commissioners, County Welfare Board, and several citizens have given their support of this bill. It is sincerely hoped that those who read this will give the matter thoughtful consideration and a letter to Congress would greatly aid passage of the bill. Write to Congressman Robert L. Doughton, Chairman, Ways and Means Committee, House of Representatives, Washington, D. D. In contacting Mr. Doughton, please request that your letter be entered in the written record of the hearings on the social security program. It will also be helpful to send a copy to Congressman A. J. Forand, House of Representatives, who introduced the Public Welfare Act."
