Residents of Brunswick county have four things for which to be thankful in connection with the medical set-up that protects their health.

Three of these reasons for being thankful are the trio of doctors who serve them. We doubt that three more competent men of medicine may be found in a single county in North Carolina.

The fourth thing for which they may well be thankful is the J. Arthur Doshier Memorial Hospital at Southport, which makes it possible for three men to minister the medical needs of this many people, scattered over an area the size of our county.
