FRESH VEGETABLES SUPPLEMENT DIET

Scarce items on food list will be supplemented by using available fresh produce this year.

Brunswick county residents will offset short supplies of meat, wheat, fats and oils by consuming nearly 9,322,400 pounds of the nation's bumper fresh fruits and vegetable crop to maintain high nutritional standards this year, it was predicted today by a leading food distributor.

"Fresh fruits and vegetables will adequately supplement the limited supplies of many foods now available," said Harvey Baum, nationally known food expert. "Increased use of perishable produce will permit shipment of other foods to those hunger-ridden nations now subsisting on daily diets ranging from 1,000 to 1,300 calories as compared with an average of 3,300 calories for this country."

Part of the fresh fruits and vegetables consumed by Brunswick residents comes from this county's 1,721 farms and neighboring growers. Large amounts of perishables are received from other sections to meet the county's year-round needs. The de-
