### Strong Team To Be Sent Against Stars Of Majors

### Hodges To Direct Band Next Monday Night As Night Baseball Is Inaugurated

The semi-pro team which will meet stars of major league diamonds in Legion Memorial Stadium one week from tonight were tentatively announced today.

Assurances that the game will go off as scheduled and will mark the first time a baseball contest is played under lights in Columbus county were given this morning by R. L. Sholar, general chairman of Legion Field, who said lighting fixtures were now going up and transformers were now on their way from Atlanta, Ga.

A possibility existed that installations may be completed by midweek. P. K. Avant and John Charles Maulsby left yesterday for Atlanta to bring the transformers here.

At press time today, it was learned that Charlie Ripple, famed local pitcher who hurled for Sacramento in the Pacific Coast League this season, will be on the mound for the local team. Ripple was formerly with Philadelphia in the National League.

It will be a star-studded aggregation that Manager Earl Brinkley will send in against Buddy Lewis and his barnstormers. Back of the plate will be either Ted Russ or Buck Hardee. And on the mound, he will take his pick from such local greats as "Weenie" Brown, Snag Allen, Cole Jacobs, and H. D. Stanley.

Brinkley may play first base himself, or he may send in Fred Caswell. On second it will be Herbert Russ and at short, Joe Brown Proctor. At third it will be either Bud Heath or Shelton
