decisions regarding specifications and such matters as planting dates, pasture mixtures most suitable for this county, and other matters requiring local determination.

It is hoped that the Brunswick County Handbook will be approved in time to distribute to all farmers in the county by October 1 in order that they can

their plans regarding practices which require action this fall. For example, a farmer who plans a winter cover crop of rye, wheat, oats or barley will need to obtain prior approval of the county committee in time to seed the crop by October 1, 1948, and will then need to report the acreage seeded at the county office by November 1, 1948.

One important change from previous programs is that prior approval of the county committee will be required for all practices, and that a farmer will be required to report practices carried out immediately after completing the practice. This plan of operation will enable the county committee to make efficient use of the funds available.

feather followed by a beautiful white marlin breaking water as he sought to throw a bait from his jaws.

Carr and party of Clinton had 4 bonita and 200-pounds of seabass and snappers; a Wilmington party including Joe LeGwin, Lou Mahler, Admer Brown, caught 65 blues and one king mackerel; Dr. Rod King and a Wilmington party caught 32 blues, 6 mackerel and 2 king mackerel Sunday.

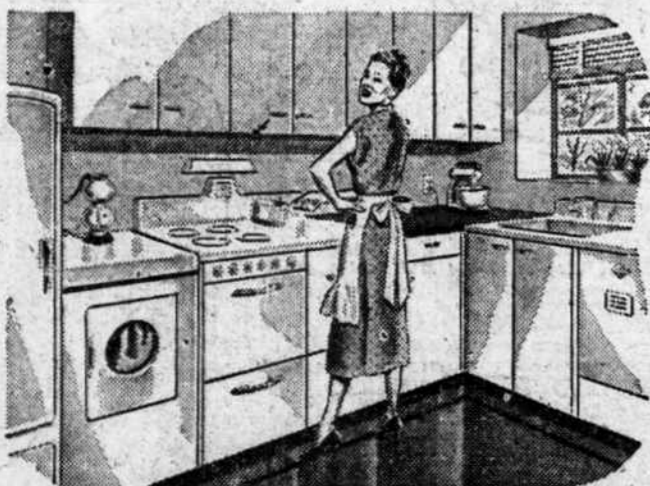
