Continued From Page One extra clerks and carriers, setting up new sorting tables, hauling out reserve mail sacks, and overhauling delivery trucks. Thousands of bright new postage stamps are on hand, and the post office pens are all getting new points.

To keep Christmas mail on schedule, the Postmaster asks that you-

1. Stop at the post office next week to purchase the extra stamp you're going to need, thus crowds last-minute When buying stamps for Christmas cards, bear in mind the desirability of sending the cards as first class mail; also the fact that the rate for unsealed cards has been increased from 11/2 to 2c

each. 2. Check and revise your Christmas card address list this week-Purchase your Christmas early and address and stamp them at once. Then stack them in a convenient place for mailing at the proper time.

3. Lay in adequate supplies of cardboard, sturdy outer strong cord, and printed Fourth Class labels for wrapping parcel post. Packages are limited to 70 pounds in weight, and must not measure more than 100 inches in length and girth combined. Repeat the address inside the outer wrappings, in case they are

damaged in transit. If you worry about the recipient peeking, the Postmaster advises pasting "Do Not Open Until Christmas" stickers on packages and the backs of greeting

3. Completion of rural electrification.

4. Rural telephone service: "You may have a good road, a good school and electric service, but you are still isolated." The REA authority made it

clear that he loked forward to the extension of telephone service on a scale comparable to the progress already made in rural electricfication.

"We're in about the same condition today with respect to telephone service that we were in 11 or 12 years ago in rural electric service." he said. He emphasized that the public utility companies would be given an opportunity to supply the need for rural telephones, but said the machinery had been set up for telephone cooperatives. On a show of hands, approxi-

mately 80 per cent of the Brunswick REA membership indicated that they would welcome telephone service.

Price sounded a call for diversification in farming in relating an account of his visit to a farm home in the mountains where an electric line was being cut-in for the first time. There he found milk cows, beef cattle, sheep, brood sows, cabbage, other farm produce, and burley tobacco. This was the kind of farm, the REA chairman asserted, which would always keep electricity. Dependence on one or two crops could work otherwise, Price inferred.


