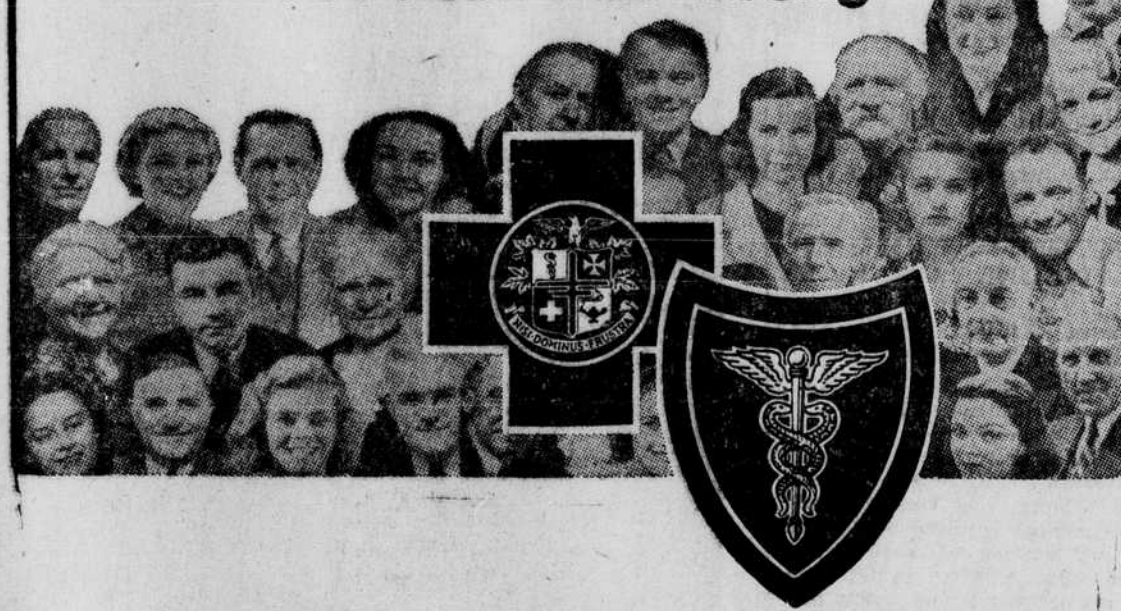

Their return was the first inkling that the families had received as to whether they were living or dead. Years later all three of them were given Federal pensions and this caused some of their neighbors to accuse them of having been traitors.

The men always insisted that the accusations were unjust, saying that they were forced to enlist or see their homes shelled and their families perhaps killed. Many of their neighbors believed their stories, but until the time when they died two or three de-

cades ago, they were often referred to as Yankees or traitors. Captain Bowen and Captain Puckett both still have descendants living in Brunswick county. For all that is known to the contrary, King may also have descendants.
