\$250,000.00 For School Building Construction In This County

SOUTHPORT

From the opening day of the 1949 General Assembly I was deeply interested and actively identified with the Educational program. I was one of the signers of the original bill, and fought for its passage.

Sales Tax Exemption On Fuel For Curing Tobacco & **Sweet Potatoes**

Better Schools & Roads Bond Election

When the time for the Better Schools & Road Bond Election came, our people were almost unanimously in favor of the program. \$100,000 Per Year For Veterans Service Officers For The State

This was my own bill, drawn and introduced by me to help our poorer counties provide a Veterans Service Officer to assist ex-service men and members of their families with problems arising out of their connection with the armed forces. It was the intent of this bill to make available \$1,000.00 per year for each county to help pay for this office. Already this has effected a savings of more than \$2,000.00 for Brunswick

Repeal Of The Auto Inspection Law

This was a haphazard combination of regulations which was working unfair hardships on many of our people, and I felt that some relief was due them. I introduced and fought for the passage of the bill to re-
