Denning presented a detailed list of needs to take care of the expanded building program. His report showed approximately \$45,180.00 to be realized from the present tax rate, with ad-

The board is faced with the prospect of raising the tax rate, but hopes to be able to space the additional load under a two year plan which will make it possible to do the job without a major increase. At the present time Brunswick county levies a total of 25-cents for school purpose which is a full 20-cents under the levy in any adjoining ounty for schols.

The commissioners also approved a fourth of july holiday for county employees which will in-clude both Monday and Tuesday This will cause the postponement of the next meeting of the board county commissioners until hursday, July 6th.
