Meetings Being Attended By Outstanding Church Offi-cials For North Carolina And Other Leaders

Rev. Earle Bradley is representing the Baptist State Convention at this session of the Association, and Dr. W. K. Mc-Gee is representing the hospital. Rev. R. K. Redwine will bring a report of the work of the Baptist Assemblies at the meeting today in Chapel Hill Church.
