Tells Audience At Picnic Friday Afternoon That Brunswick County Can Become Another "Valley Of The Nile"

Gov. W. Kerr Scott with a group of State Highway officials and other officials visited Holden Beach on Friday for an old-fashioned picnic and beach outing.

Luther Holden, S. E. Holden and Dr. R. H. Holden, for whose family the beach is named, and Richard Weaver, Whiteville attorney, who assisted in arranging for the visit, met the Governor and his party at the ferry. They accompanied them on a tour of the island, pointing out the filling in of Lockwood's Folly Inlet and the erosion of that end of the beach, as well as other spots of interest.

Brunswick county residents turned out en masse, together with a large number of the beach visitors, to welcome Governor Scott. A picnic dinner was served promptly at 5:30 o'clock.
