Word Received This Week From Congressman F. Er-tel Carlyle Indicates That Operations Will Get Underway In About Four Months

Activities Expected To Pick Up In Speed During Com-ing Weeks With Full-Scale Work Being Set For Mid-Sum-

By W. B. KEZIAH Word from Congressman F. Ertel Carlyle this week is to the effect that he has checked with the military officials in Washington and that they have advised him that construction at Sunny Point will be underway in four months.
