United Forces Meeting Draws Heated Comment

Educational Leaders Hear Candidates For House Of Representatives Define Stand On School Matters

MINTZ SAYS ONLY ONE VACANCY ON BOARD

Points Out That Three Of Present Board Named For Four Years And Leland Man Without Opposition For Job

A county-wide meeting of the Brunswick County United Forces for Education Monday night at Bolivia was enlivened by a spiritverbal clash between Harry Mintz and Odell Williamson, two of the three candidates for the Democratic nomination for the House of Representatives.

The meeting had been called to give the education forces an opportunity to sound out the position of the prospective legislators with regard to the program being sponsored by the organiza-

The meeting was called to order by the vice president, Mrs. McKeithan, and after a report had been made of the stand on educational matters taken by the gubernatorial candidates and the condidates for lieutenant-governor, Mintz, who represented Brunswick County in the last session of the General Assembly, took the floor.

He pointed to a list of five objectives of the United Forces for Education which had been written on the board and declared that if he goes to Raleigh-he will support every one of them.
