The employees who have already reached here say that they do not know when the dredge will arrive. They were merely told to be here before Christmas day and ready to go to work The ship, its pipeline barges and other equipment is being brought in by tugs and is said to be scheduled to arrive before Christmas. Since considerable leeway is allowed she may arrive here several days before the scheduled time, provided there has been no trouble enroute.

Other dredges are scheduled to arrive in early January and February.
