

Diamond Firm Shares Another Big Building Job

Word Received That Company Now Engaged In Work On Sunny Point Docks Will Join Bethlehem Steel Company On

COMBINED BID IS TWELVE MILLION

No Early Prospect For Equiplement From Local Pro-ject To Re Transferred To New Job At Norfolk

The Diamond Construction Company of Savannah, Ga., now engaged on the 8 million dollar Sunny Point dock construction job, has come in for another huge contraction task this time com-bined with the Bethlehem Steel company of Bethlehem, Pa. The job is for the building of a toll bridge for the Virginia State Highway Commission. The structure is to be across the Rappana-nock River between Grey's Point and White Stone.

The Virginia State Highway Commission announced following the opening of the bids that the low bid was that of the Bethle-hem Steel Company and Diamond Construction Company combined

The bridge and substructure authorized in this contract is being financed by a 100-million dollar revenue bond issue, just authorized by the Virginia Highway Commission. The same funds will also finance construction of the Hampton Roads bridge-tunnel system and refund bonds issued in 1949 for the purchases and construction of other toll facilities.

Ken Stewart, superintendent of Construction on the Sunny Point docks for the Diamond company, said yesterday that rigs own by the company and now in Norfolk will probably go to the Rappahannock job first. Those now in use here still have a total of 1,800 piles to drive for the three structures. After getting through with the above reinforced cen pilings they will have to turn back and drive 600 greenheart timber pilings to serve as buffers between the concrete pilings and
