

For soap jelly, dissolve one part soap in five parts of boiling water. Allow to cool and thicken for several hours. For "dry" soapsuds, put a cup-

ful of this soap jelly into a deep bowl and whip with a rotary egg beater or electric mixer to produce a stiff, light, meringue-like lather. Or just beat the soap itself with a small amount of water the same way.

Either the jelly or "dry" suds can be brushed or sponged directly on the surface to be wash-
