Burning Permit Law Effective Now In County

Landowners Must Notify Officials Of Intention To Burn And Must Obtain Permit For This Practice

LIST PLACES TO **OBTAIN PERMITS**

Cooperation Of Public Is Solicited In Keeping This County's Forest Areas Free From Fires

County Ranger D. L. Mercer this week reminded citizens of Brunswick county that it is again necessary to obtain a burning permit before doing any burning within five hundred feet of any woodland.

The State law relating to the burning of brush reads as follows: "Starting fires within five hundred (500) feet of areas under protection of State Forest Service It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to start or cause to be started any fire or ignite any material in any of the areas of woodslands under the protection of the State Forest Service or within five hundred (500) feet of any such protected area, during the hours starting at midnight and ending at 4:00 p. 1 fire or ignite any material in such above mentioned between the first day of October and the first day of June, inclusive. No charge shall be made for the granting of said permits.

During periods of hazardous forest fire conditions, the State Forester is authorized to cancel all permits prohibit the starting of any fires in any of the woodlands under the protection of the State Forest or within five hundred (500) feet of any such protected area.
