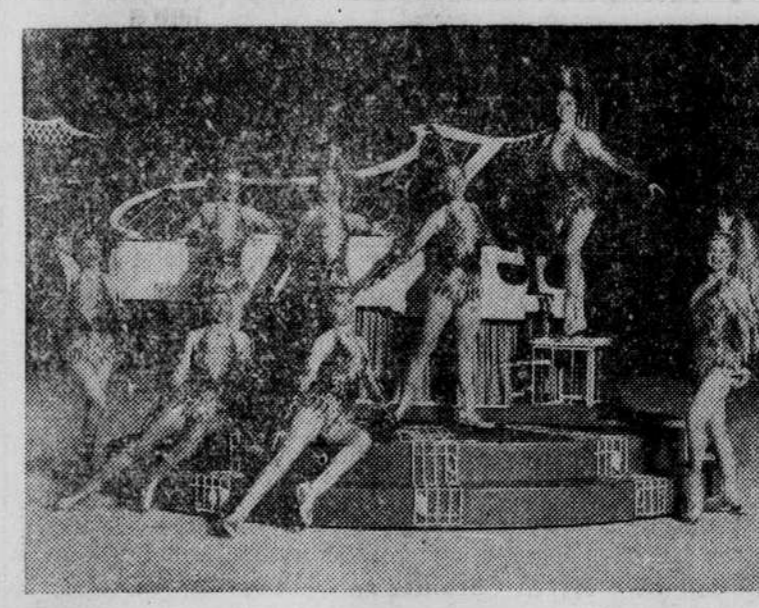
WORKING ON PARK

He received a bruised chest but no broken bones when the car in which he was riding went out of control and overturned on highway 130 at the intersection of the Midway road. The accident happened Saturday night and Galloway was still a patient at the Doshier Memorial Hospital yesterday morning.

Corporal O. H. Lynch investigated the wreck and held Kenneth Simmons, also of Fort Eustis, on a charge of reckless driving. Simmons has since been released on a \$300 bond. Simmons alleged that he was coming out of the Midway road and did not see the highway and the turn.

When he did see it he lost control and crashed across highway 130.
