Hungarian Relief Channel Set Up

RALEIGH—"Citizens of North Carolina who want to sponsor Hungarian refugees are asked to channel their requests through the Governor's Advisory Committee on the Refugee Relief Act," said Dr. Ellen Winston, chairman of the Committee in North Carolina.

Prospective sponsors should request the necessary forms by writing to Dr. Winston at the State Board of Public Welfare, Raleigh. These forms, when completed by the sponsors, will be forwarded by the Committee to certain voluntary agencies which are aiding in the Hungarian refugee program.

Sponsors are required to provide housing, a job, and inland transportation costs for the refugees.

"We have been informed that virtually no domestic servants or orphans are available among the Hungarian refugee group. Refugees who are qualified for farm work are also in short supply," said Dr. Winston. "Prospective sponsors should also take into consideration the fact that most of the refugees speak only Hungarian."

There were 7 mid-wife meetings at Southport, none at Shallotte. Typhoid immunizations at Southport, were 338, with 555 at Shallotte, a total of 893. In the mothers and infants clinics at which both public health nurses assist there were 8 at Southport and 120 at Shallotte, a total of 128. Family services and office visits show 69 at Southport and 59 at Shallotte, a total of 128.

After hearing this report, members of the Board of Health passed a resolution requesting members of the board of county commissioners to locate a Health Center building at Southport.
